What will the attitude of the people of Medford be on future campaigns for funds? This question must be considered by them sooner or later and therefore the forum committee of the Medford Chamber of Commerce has set aside the forum tomorrow for the discussion of this question.

The Salvation Army last May wanted a campaign for funds. It was not considered an opportune time and it was postponed until September but for some unknown reason the campaign never took place.

Up to the present time no demand has been made of the citizens of Jackson county from state headquarters for funds for the relief of the starving Chinese, but that request is momentarily expected.

Funds for the support of the local work of the Red Cross are exhausted and unless money is provided the work must necessarily be discontinued.

What other relief measures will be put up to the people of Medford are not known, but there should be some action taken by the citizens as to what their attitude will be and whatever decision is arrived at, it should be the expression of the leading citizens of the community and for this reason members of the Medford Chamber of Commerce are urged to be present at the forum.

This being On Time week, an effort should be made that all assemble promptly in the lobby at noon. Luncheon will be served ten minutes past twelve in the large dining room of the Medford hotel.
