

### MEDFORD TOSSERS REGAINING FORM FOR ASHLAND GO

The Medford high basketball tossers are again hitting their stride and displaying some of the clever floor work and basket shooting of early-season games. The slump in the last Roseburg game was but temporary as is evidenced by the form shown by the Red and Black men in recent practice work-outs, a fact which is encouraging to local supporters, and when Medford and Ashland tangle for the first time this season on the Ashland floor Friday night Medford fans are expecting the home five to give the Granite City quintet a stiff scrimmage. Ashland is now virtually at the head of the Southern Oregon conference having succeeded in downing Roseburg in two games last week and if Medford is able to win three out of four of the Medford-Ashland series she will still be a strong contender for the honors of this section although there is still a controversy over the first Roseburg game which is claimed by Roseburg.

The Medford boys are in better condition than they were Saturday which means that Friday and Saturday's games will be hummers. In the Friday night's game, however, heavy odds are in favor of an Ashland victory because of the small Ashland floor, but the Saturday battle on Medford's regulation floor promises to be one of the fastest and best of this season's hoop-fights. Owing to controversy over officials, Ashland will have the privilege of selecting the men who will handle Friday and Saturday's games. As a preliminary to the main events the Medford high girls will play the Ashland sextet for the Southern Oregon championship. Since both teams will enter the fray with a long list of victories to their credit and confident of winning, these games promise to be the fastest of their kind played this season. Fifty reserved tickets for Friday's game at Ashland will be on sale at Crowson's tomorrow morning to accommodate the rooters from this city. Twenty-five first row, 20 second row and 75 third row tickets for Saturday's game at the Natatorium will be released for sale at the same time. The present ticket sale indicates a record breaking crowd for this second game of the series.

### KLAMATH F. FILES PROTEST AGAINST MEDFORD ANGLER

Several matters of importance in the preservation and propagation of fish and game were taken up at a meeting of the executive committee of the Klamath county sportsmen's association yesterday afternoon. The question of reducing the limit for large fish, or to stop fishing from motor boats and boats propelled by kickers on the Upper lake, was considered. Thousands of pounds of fish are taken each year near Rocky Point by persons fishing from motor boats. Most of these fish, it was said, are gutted or smoked and shipped from the county. One instance was cited of a man who last year took 800 pounds of smoked fish home to Medford when he finished his vacation. Not knowing what to do with them he gave them to a butcher who sold them across his counter at the market price, 40 cents a pound.—Klamath Falls Herald.

### ROBINS HELD TO G. JURY \$1000 BOND

The preliminary hearing of George Robins, the bogus check man captured last Saturday night, was held before Justice Taylor today on the charge of passing a \$40 forged check on Jens Jensen. He was represented by his attorney, former County Prosecutor G. M. Roberts, and the state was represented by Assistant County Prosecutor George Coddling. No defense was offered and Attorney Roberts did not even cross question the state's witnesses. Robins was held to the grand jury in \$1000 bail. The charge against Robins of passing a forged \$40 check on the Model Clothing company did not come up, and is being held in abeyance for the present.

The other authorizes the highway commission to sell short term bonds

It took just 21 minutes last night for the senate to pass approximately \$6,659,000 in appropriations for the biennium of 1921 and 1922.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 23.—Concluding highway legislation of the state legislature was enacted by the senate today, including the 7,999,000 bond bill and the latest Roosevelt bill. Both were house measures and now go to the governor. The bond measure will bring the total in bonds authorized for highway purposes to within \$3,000,000 of the constitutional limitation of four per cent of the assessed property valuation of the state.
