EUREKA, CALIF., HASN'T HAD A JAP 36 YEARS

EUREKA, Cal., Feb. 24.—Humboldt county, far up on the northern California coast, is not worrying about the Oriental immigration problem, for there are no Japanese in the county and for thirty-six years only one native of China has resided within its boundaries. Chinese were expelled from Eureka, the county seat, when David Kendall, a city councilman, was shot and killed February 6, 1885 by a wild revolver shot fired during a tong war here. For a long time before Kendall's death there had been growing dissatisfaction among the citizens and when the councilman was killed, a mass meeting was held, committees named and Chinese were given twenty-four hours to leave the city under pain of death.

To make the warning more effective, a life-sized and business-like gallows was erected in Chinatown. When the next steamer left for San Francisco, all Eureka Chinese and their movable property were on the wharf. Since then, no Orientals, with one exception, have been allowed to live in the county.

The one exception is a cook who, according to tradition was employed in 1885 by a trapper in Butler valley. The Chinaman was not molested, partly because of his remote position but chiefly because he was married to a native woman and had a family and also because he was employed by a man who was attached to him and who was known as a fighter.

The old Chinaman is still living in Butler Valley. Last year's United States census figures gave Humboldt fifteen Chinese but no Japanese. Officials here believe the fifteen Chinese are offspring of this one cook and the Indian woman. Occasionally and at long intervals attempts have been made to bring Japanese labor here, but the Japanese are not welcome. Several years ago a crew of Chinese fish handlers were brought to Loleta, a coast point, to help handle the salmon catch of the Bel river. They were at once locked in their car and the conductor told to get them out at once. No second call was necessary.

As recently as last summer the Pacific Sea Products Co., building a whaling station at Trinidad, thirty miles north of here, brought a few Japanese laborers up from San Francisco, but they no sooner appeared on the ground than the attitude of the residents made it plain that they were not welcome. The Japanese then walked back to this city where the first outbound train returned them to San Francisco. Residents say the treaty between the United States and Japan is likely to make little difference here in the matter of Oriental intrusion.

OCEAN LINERS MAY SOON SAIL FROM CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb.—Assuming that the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence water way to the ocean will be opened in the near future, Colonel W. V. Judson, United States district engineer of the Chicago district, has issued a bulletin in which he states that it does not require a great stretch of imagination to picture ocean vessels bound to and from Chicago will carry passengers in large numbers, as a matter of economy in the case of immigrants and as a matter of economy, convenience and pleasure for other passengers who will wish to see the scenic beauties of the Thousand Islands and avoid sea-sickness and expense while proceeding between Europe and this general neighborhood. I conceive, therefore, that port facilities will be required in Harbor District No. 3, upon the Lake Shore, south of 14th street, where passenger vessels bound to or from the transfer harbor near the state line will touch in passing to take on or let off passengers as well, perhaps, as express and package freight.

BISHOP PLEADS FOR CHURCH TO MAINTAIN PEACE

BUFFALO, N. Y.—The world war has awakened the church to its tremendous resources, Bishop Thomas Nicholson told the delegates to the annual meeting of the Episcopal council of cities here today. "The latest figures give the direct and indirect costs of the world war to be \$318,000,000,000 in money and 43,000,000 lives," he said. "It is within the power of the church to make impossible another such world catastrophe."

Bishop Nicholson pleaded for a development of progress and modern business methods in the church. "We must have faith in ourselves," he said, "and in our ability to do and to give, and we must be willing to bring the methods of work of the modern church up on a scale commensurate with the progress and development of modern business methods."

"The demand of the hour is for more spiritual power. Not long since I was on the Great Lakes. I saw one of the largest steamers afloat. The owner was aboard and with pride he showed me over the great engine. Then he showed me how they had duplicate engines so that if anything went wrong with the machinery on one part they had an entirely new set of boilers and engines to carry the ship through. They burned hundreds of tons of coal a day, but they could make time in the face of the greatest storm which could be anticipated on the lakes."

"A few days later I was on a little old boat built twenty-five years ago, with its sputtering engine. It is as useless to try to run the big ocean liners with the steam power of that little boat as it is to run the modern church with the degree of spiritual power we have had in the past. The power of God is unlimited. The greatest need of the hour is the development of moral and spiritual power which will match the commercial and industrial masteries of our age."

JAPAN DEMANDS CHINA'S APOLOGY AND INDEMNITY

BEIJING, Feb. 19.—Demands for compensation, damages and an apology growing out of the burning of a Japanese consulate and the killing and wounding of Japanese subjects by Chinese or Korean bandits in Hungchun last October, have been presented to the Chinese government by the Japanese legation here.

After the raid, the Japanese sent troops into the territory, which is a part of Manchuria under Chinese jurisdiction and their withdrawal has been a subject of discussion between the two powers for several months. All but two battalions are said to have been removed, and the Chinese government is refraining from going into the question of reparations until the remaining troops are evacuated.

Counter claims for damages and other satisfaction are said to be forthcoming from the Chinese government, due to alleged deprivations by Japanese troops by their occupation of the territory.

W. S. BARNUM WINS SUIT FROM CAL. ORE. POWER CO.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 24.—The supreme court has affirmed the decree of the Jackson county circuit court upholding the claims of W. S. Barnum in his suit against the Southern Oregon Traction company.

This case arose out of a claim of the California Oregon Power company against the Southern Oregon Traction company for electric current furnished to the Southern Oregon Traction company, while it was operating the Jacksonville railroad. The California Oregon Power company intervened in the case, where the mortgage was foreclosed by Barnum, and asked that its claim, amounting to some \$1600 should be paid out of the corpus of the property, which would mean that Mr. Barnum would be required to pay for that current used, amounting to \$1600.

Judge Calkins decided against the California Oregon Power company, and the power company appealed, and the supreme court decision affirmed the decision of the lower court.

Porter J. Neff was attorney for appellant and Gus Newbury, attorney for Respondent Barnum.
