Hines was granted a change of venue to Josephine county last week on the grounds that prejudice existed against him in this county. At the fall session of the grand jury Hines was indicted on seven counts.

The Americans, after given their first sight of Germany declared they liked the country but Peter Andres of Kansas summed up the sentiments of the party by saying: "There is too much misery here. There are too many rich and too many poor. But then it seems the people must be one or the other. Kansas suits me."

The German Red Cross does not plan to take other American parties on tours of the country Herr Schmidt said today. "Don't you like Americans?" he was asked.

"Yes, but we haven't enough money," he replied. "The American Dairy Cattle company which forwarded the milk cows to Germany asked us to do this so that the boys could report on conditions on their return."

Asked if what they had seen would appear to justify the gift of the cattle to Germany, several of the Americans said: "We have had plenty to eat and have been banqueted everywhere but everywhere we have seen hungry children and tubercular adults who need milk."

TURK TREATY TO WAIT ON VISIT TO NEAR EAST

LONDON, Feb. 24.—(By Associated Press.) The solution of the Near East problem relating to Turkey which will be reached by the allied supreme council will be to send an allied commission of inquiry to the Near East to examine the claims of Greece and Turkey in the disputed provinces of Smyrna and Thrace, it was forecast in well informed circles here today.

Meantime a cessation of hostilities between the Turks and Greeks will be declared.

This will delay a final settlement three or four months and the French delegates express the hope that by that time the United States will be in a position to participate in the ultimate treaty.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—(By Associated Press.) Repech Pasha, delegate of the Constantinople government to the Near East conference here, speaking for both his group and that of the nationalists, told the allied conferees today that both factions of the Turks would accept the decisions of the allies.

The attitude of the Turks made an excellent impression upon the conferees. Premier Briand of France declared after the sitting that the conference had gone a long way toward a settlement.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Consideration of the Near Eastern problems by allied and Turkish delegates began here today. The Turkish representatives entered the conference in two separate bodies, the Turkish nationalist envoys having refused to join the delegates of the sultan's government.

Premier Lloyd George sat with Premier Briand of France and Count Sforza, Italian foreign minister. On the other side of the table sat Earl Curzon of Kedleston, secretary of state for foreign affairs with Japanese delegates at his right.

The Turkish representatives were given a separate table. Tewfik Pasha, representative of the sultan's government, looked feeble and ill when he was assisted into the room by his staff. Bekir Samy Bey, head of the Turkish nationalist delegation and his colleagues entered the room after Tewfik Pasha.

The two Turkish delegations, although hostile to each other, nevertheless apparently have a common purpose, many observers crediting them with acting on the theory that they can obtain more by acting apart than by fusion.

The Angora delegation has given the French to understand that if the conference does not grant an adequate revision of the treaty of Sevres, Mustapha Kemal Pasha desires to negotiate directly with France. The nationalists affirm that they have 80,000 men in reserve, well equipped for field service.

Bekir Samy Bey, the nationalist spokesman, who is more of a soldier than a diplomat, was the outstanding figure on the Turkish side of the table. He not only interrupted Lloyd George when the latter was speaking, but when the Turks were pressed for details of their demands he undertook to give them.

The two delegations agreed on the broad principles of maintaining the integrity of the Ottoman empire. They demanded the return of Thrace and Smyrna to Turkey. The liberty of the straits and military and financial control in Constantinople were insisted upon.

The conference adjourned with the understanding that the Turks would submit their proposals in writing tomorrow.

The verdict was returned 55 minutes after the case had been given to the jury.

GOVERNOR VETOES BRIDE EXAM.

(Continued From Page One) bill and to authorize a veterans' relief commission to bond the state up to approximately \$30,000,000 for the bonus.

Some important legislation relating to the industrial accident commission was enacted. The principal bill, revises the rates of compensation benefits for workers and puts into effect an experience rating system from employers.

Safety Changes The following changes in salaries are provided in the several bills which have yet to be passed upon by the governor.

State superintendent of schools, increased from \$3000 to \$4000; attorney general, \$3600 to \$4000; state engineer \$3000 to \$3600; insurance commissioner \$2000 to \$3000; governor \$5000 to \$7500; state tax commissioner \$2400 to \$3000; corporation commissioner \$3000 to \$3600; superintendent of banks \$4000 to \$6000. Besides these increases the fixing of the salary of the state veterinarian is placed in the hands of the state livestock sanitary board, the salaries of the state prison warden and his deputies and the parole officer are to be fixed by the governor; salaries of the heads of other state institutions are to be fixed by the board of control and the salary of the state land board will be fixed by the land board.

Fish Fight Ended Revisions in the salaries of district attorneys of the state were upward. The legislature refused to increase the pay of jurors and also refused to increase the salaries of public service commissioners by \$800 each which was asked for in a bill. A bill to increase the salary of the state printer failed.

Fish and game legislation enacted is expected to settle difficulties over administration of the commercial fishing and the game interests. For forty years fishing on Rogue river has been in controversy. This was met by the Rogue river fishing bill which passed at this session. Bills also separated the commercial fishing and game interests by providing for the appointment of a commercial fish commission

of three members and a game commission of five members, both to be appointed by the governor.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 24.—Governor Olcott signed a bill providing for licensing of real estate brokers. He also signed the bill conveying the Oregon building at the site of the Panama-Pacific exposition to the commanding general of the ninth army corps area.

Since he began the selection, Mr. Harding has kept on the safe side and has made virtually all of his invitations to membership more or less provisional.

Discussing the question of Herbert C. Hoover's acceptance of the commerce portfolio, the president-elect said today that he could understand easily how the former food administrator might desire to know something of the detailed policies of the administration before agreeing to take the place. It is understood that Mr. Harding and Mr. Hoover are in communication now on that subject and there is every evidence that the discussion is pointing towards an acceptance.
