PHILOSOPHY OF GOD'S SALVATION REVIVAL THEME

A large audience heard Rev. J. A. Smith's sermon, "The Philosophy of Salvation" Thursday night at the First Methodist church. Interest is increasing with each service and there is general satisfaction that the revival is to continue this week. Rev. Dr. Smith said, in part:

"God is a sovereign. The universe is His kingdom. Just as the presence of creation implies that God is a creator, the presence of laws implies that He is a ruler."

God's kingdom is divided into two realms. The material and the spiritual. The material realm is framed upon a fabric of laws which are certain and immutable. We are familiar with some of these forces of nature as the law of gravity or the combustion of matter. These laws are universally operative and no exception is made because of ignorance of their nature. The penalty for their violation is exacted as certainly from an innocent child as from a university professor of physics.

The spiritual realm of God's universe is built upon a framework of laws just as inevitable and changeless as the laws of physical nature.

What is a law? It might be a natural force, uniform and universal in its operation, inherent in the very nature of the physical universe. It might be a principle of moral conduct inherent in the economy of the spiritual realm. It might be a legislative enactment written upon our statute books. But in every case to be just the penalty attached to its violation, must be severe in proportion to the right, which the law is designed to safeguard. For example, theft is the violation of a law designed to protect the right of property and merits a penitentiary sentence. Murder is the violation of a law designed to protect a much more important right, the right of life and merits the capital punishment.

But all of God's spiritual laws are designed to protect rights of the soul of such infinite importance and eternal significance that the violation of any one of them merits death. "The wages of sin is death."

The sinner, whether he violate many or few of God's spiritual laws, is a spiritual anarchist. A man who violates only a few of the laws of the state of Oregon is not considered an anarchist. Wherein lies the difference? The difference lies in the fact that the laws of the state of Oregon are a multiplicity they are not mutually dependent; they do not stand or fall together; they are distinct in their principle. But the laws of God's spiritual realm are a unity; they are mutually dependent, based upon a common principle, and stand or fall together. The decalogue is not made up of ten distinct laws, but ten different manifestations of the same underlying principle—the love of God and man. And the man who violates one of the ten commandments violates the underlying principle of them all and is a rebel to divine authority."

ASHLAND ELECTION C. OF COMMERCE ON MARCH EIGHTH

ASHLAND, Feb. 25.—The city is to have another special election, incident to which the adjournment is to "vote for six." This refers to the choice of directors for the Chamber of Commerce, the election to be held on Tuesday, March 8. Primary ballots are already being mailed out. The board consists of a dozen members, including E. V. Carter, W. H. McNair, V. O. N. Smith, J. W. McCoy, A. C. Briggs, F. L. Engle, Henry Enders, Jr., C. A. Edwards, L. F. Ferguson, J. H. McGee, Mrs. H. T. Elmore, and F. C. Homes. Of this number, Carter, Smith, McCoy, McNair, Ferguson and Homes are holdovers, serving until 1922, consequently only six new members of the board are to be selected. The names of twelve members receiving the greatest number of votes at the primary will be placed on the final election ballot, the choice of six to be determined at this election.

Any member on the roster is eligible for nomination. This plan, as adopted last year, will govern the election of directors, and through this channel the policies of the chamber of commerce regarding all of its major activities will be recommended, even if not absolutely dictated. In the campaign last year the quota of 500 members was more than realized, the minimum payment from each being one dollar per month. All classifications are included in the list of members, as to business, professional, and various employments. There are about half a dozen clergymen on the rolls, and a number of school teachers. Corporations are represented, including Standard Oil and Mason, Ehrman & Co. The Methodist church is one of the signatories to the membership list, also the Elks club, the Ashland Printing Co., and First Company of the National Guard.

Universal suffrage rules in these chamber of commerce elections. A specific committee has gone over the roster, and by the process of elimination has fixed the active membership list at approximately 350 eligible to vote at this primary, of which number about 60 are women. The ethics of an ideal membership imply that an individual director should be open-minded and tolerant; be forceful and willing to work; be tactful; be non-partisan; be a leader in own sphere; not use organization for personal ends; lend prestige to board; have absolute faith in Ashland and the commercial club. Also that the board of directors collectively should be representative—men or women who are leaders from each sphere; be capable of team work; be thorough in everything; be expeditious; be observant of the ethics of the board meetings. Their function is judicial rather than legislative.
