THINKS UNCLE SAM RELATED TO ABE LINCOLN

Conrad Reinking, a German farmer living near Jacksonville was admitted to citizenship Monday by Judge F. M. Calkins, but his plea was held in abeyance for a few hours because of the attitude and utterances of John H. Hueners, one of his witnesses. Hueners said he was a "disciple of LaFollette," and that the latter's stand on the sinking of the Lusitania was one of good judgment. He was extremely firm in his views, and while Hueners was testifying Reinking nudged him for caution. Hueners was classified as a German socialist.

Theophile T. Provost, a Southern Pacific painter thought he was a citizen, voted several times, but discovered recently that he was not. He asked naturalization, and became bewildered on the witness stand. He could not name the governor or a senator of this state, and told the investigator that "Uncle Sam was an Uncle of Abraham Lincoln, or ought to be." Neither did he know what the Fourth of July commemorated. For his lack of knowledge he was chided by his aged father, who pleaded that his boy knew but "could not think before a crowd."

Henry and George Shafer, born in Russia, and residents of this country since babyhood, thought they were citizens, but found out during the war that their folks had failed to comply fully with the laws. They had each voted many times. They were admitted upon excellent recommendations by citizens who had known them for years.

Others granted citizenship were Max A. Schulz, German; James A. Gowland, English; Rasmus C. Jorgenson, Dane, and Frederick D. Eisman, German.

SHELDON ADDRESS WEDNESDAY FORUM

At the Chamber of Commerce forum on Wednesday, Benj. C. Sheldon will address the members on what legislative measures were adopted at the recent session of the Oregon legislature, however, he will not discuss laws, as these will be presented at a later date.

March is the last month of the fiscal year for the Chamber of Commerce and it can now be seen that a record for forums is being established in that no Wednesday meeting for the entire year has been missed and that the attendance during the latter part of the year has been greater than in the beginning, thereby showing a greater interest in organized effort for the development of the community.

COMMUNITY CHEST WILL BE LEFT TO REFERENDUM VOTE

A considerable opposition has been registered with the board of directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce to the adoption of the community chest as recommended by the members' forum. Opposition was recorded against permitting drives for funds in Medford no matter for what purpose they were intended.

"In order that the board might be guided by the will of the majority, they have ordered that the question of the formation of a community chest be referred to the members for a referendum vote.

This vote will be returnable on the 15th day of March and will be included with the primary election of seven directors whose term of office expires at the annual meeting which will be held after the first of April.

Affirmative and negative arguments on the questions to be submitted are being prepared and a thorough discussion of the question is desired by the members of the board either by the holding of meetings or by communications in the local newspapers, so that when the question is settled, it may represent the best judgment of the majority interested.
