SUPREME COURT DECISION IS AID TO LOCAL ASSOCIATION

With the decision of the U. S. Supreme court sustaining the farm loan act, the farm loan associations will undoubtedly be prepared to receive applications for loans within the next two weeks.

Mr. E. H. Hurd, secretary-treasurer of the Medford and Rogue River Farm Loan associations, states that his instructions have been for some time that all old forms of application for loans will be replaced by new forms and new instructions, in order to comply with some amendments made by the present congress, approved by the president April 20, 1920 substantially as follows:

First, in regard to appraisals; the law now reads, Section 2, Article VI, of the by-laws of Farm Loan associations recently adopted to comply with said amendment, as follows: "The loan committee, whenever an application for a mortgage loan is received, shall forthwith make a cause to be made, such investigation as it may deem necessary as to the character and solvency of the applicant, and the sufficiency of the security offered, and cause written report to be made of the result of such investigation, and shall, if it concurs in such report, approve the same in writing."

Second; the third paragraph of Section 11 of said Farm Loan act as amended provides, among other matters, that any charges made against applicants for loans shall be first approved by the Farm Loan board, and shall, under no circumstances exceed 1 per centum of the amount of the loan applied for.

The marketing of bonds and the strengthening of the Farm Loan act in some particulars are now being pushed by the Farm Loan associations, through their state and national organizations, also by the national board of farm organizations and the Farm Bureaus of the United States.

Bills have been recently introduced in the present congress by Representative Dickinson of Iowa, H. R. 15952 and by Senator Kenyon of Florida, S. 4994, along these lines. While it will not be possible to secure passage of these measures by the present congress, the same will be reintroduced upon the convening of the extra session of congress the last of March. A very urgent appeal is being made upon all friends of the farm loan system to use their personal influence to secure the passage of these very important amendments to the Farm Loan act.

The price of gasoline went up a cent today when the new law passed by the legislature levying a road tax of one cent a gallon became effective on its being signed by Governor Olcott. 290*

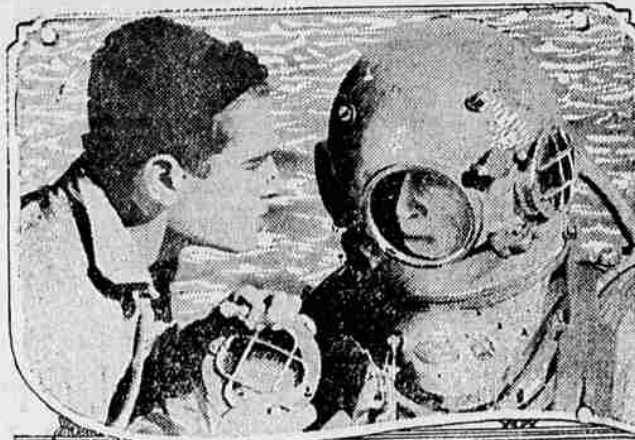
