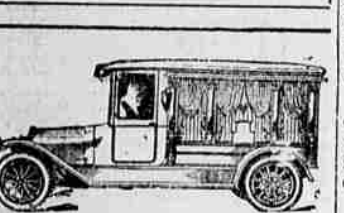

DIRT STARTS TO FLY IN MEDFORD IRRIGATION DIST.

The work of building the big Medford irrigation system with its 49 miles of new ditch, 18 miles of enlarging old ditch and constructing 400 or 500 miles of laterals was begun this week at camps 3 and 4 on the high ditch line. Camps 2 and 3 are yet to be established and the work of building the two reservoirs at Fish Lake will not begin for a month or so yet, or until the weather is thoroughly settled in that region. The force of workmen will be gradually increased until its maximum number, about 300, is reached, and work will be continued until the first of the year.

Camp 3 on the high ditch line was established Monday along Jackson creek this side of Jacksonville, and not far from the county seat with 15 or 20 men and about 20 teams and complement of graders, scrapers and the like. Camp 4 was established the same day on the old Madden place near Central Point with 15 men and an adequate number of teams and other equipment. Both camps 3 and 4 are now busy in turning up dirt. Camp 1 will be established south of the Westerlund orchard as soon as the ground is sufficiently dried out. At the present time this sticky soil is too full of moisture for work to proceed.

CONTRACTORS PLAN FOR OPEN SHOP

SPOKANE, Mar. 3.—Contractors of the Seattle, Tacoma and Yakima districts, comprising the Washington State Contractors association today adopted resolutions favoring the “open shop” and a reduction of 20 per cent in the present wage scale of building craftsmen.

Action of Spokane and Portland contractors with other members of the Associated Contractors of the Pacific Northwest was expected to favor a reduction of lesser extent. A cut of 12½ per cent from present scales was predicted by members of the Northwestern association.

The scale adopted by the state association, it was stated, will provide for wages of \$6.40 a day for carpenters, instead of \$8 as at present, with other crafts in proportion. Provision was made for an adjustment board of representatives of contractors and employes to settle all wage disputes.

LOTISSO BEGINS HIS LIFE TERM AT PENITENTIARY

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3.—Thomas Lotisso, was taken to the state penitentiary at Salem today to begin a life term for the murder of his 19 year old English war bride.

Meantime his attorneys have not given up all hope of saving him from a lifetime within prison walls. An attack upon the validity of the first degree murder statute under which Lotisso was convicted has been begun by his attorneys, who have filed a motion in the circuit court asking that the verdict of guilty be set aside and that thirty days be granted in which to file a bill of exceptions.

The particular point upon which the law, as enacted by the vote of the electorate last year is to be attacked was not disclosed by attorneys for Lotisso, but it is understood they will claim the attempt to deprive capital punishment was nullified by the alternative of life imprisonment which the present law permits.

Lotisso was sentenced yesterday afternoon.

noon to take the deposition of Charles P. Talent on the sale and conversation upon the return of the vacuum tank.

From present indications, the final arguments by both sides will be made this afternoon, and the case go to the jury late today, or early in the morning. Much interest is being manifested in the trial and the spectators include many women.

The first witness called at the Wednesday afternoon session was W. E. (Gene) Thomas, age 16 years, an employee of the Hines and Snider garage. Thomas testified that Saturday, September 13, 1919, between six and seven o'clock he drove in his auto to a house on King street to deliver some clothing, and that Evans and his wife came out to greet him. This is the hour White, star witness for the state claims Evans was holding him up. Thomas said that he recalls the incident distinctly because Evans invited him to go to a picture show and his mother told him “he couldn't go to a picture show on Sunday,” and this “made him sore.” The state made a vigorous effort to break down Thomas' testimony, particularly his certainty about his mother's objection to a Sunday movie, and his memory on incidents he testified to, in regard to the hour. Thomas drove Evans, he said, to the garage with his mother and father. Thomas was positive it was Saturday evening, and said Mrs. Evans told the defendant “to come home early,” as she “was afraid to stay alone in the big house.”

The witness said Evans told him he was going to work in the garage that night—the night White was “hugged” in the hills back of Jacksonville.

Hooker Testifies

Bert Hooker, night foreman of the Hines and Snider garage called to the stand, testified that on September 13, 1919, between five and five-thirty o'clock he met Evans in the garage and Evans asked him for his pay. Hooker said he saw Evans around the garage later Saturday evening, and that he recalled the date and day because of difficulty with a Ford truck that Evans had been working on, belonging to Sam Green of Sams valley. Witness said Evans started Green out and that it was about dusk.

James Snider, an auto mechanic and fellow worker of Evans told of working with Evans in the Hines and Snider garage, and that he saw Evans at work in the garage on September 13, 1919, the day of the crime.

Kribs Testifies

C. P. Kribs, of Willows, Cal., a former Medford grocer, testified Lark Evans was a customer, and that he waited upon him, and after making purchases of canned goods and vegetables, requested Kribs to ride home with him. The witness testified that he was certain of the date.

Evans made the purchase about 5:30 o'clock p. m., Saturday, September 13, 1919. Kribs said he identified the date from the records of Hines and Snider. Kribs was positive in his testimony, though somewhat confused as to transactions and conversations on Monday and Tuesday. Attorney Newbury for the defense then secured permission to read the testimony of Roy Keizer, a former clerk of Mr. Kribs who testified at the first trial, but is now residing in Hoquiam, Wn., in corroboration of the testimony of Mr. Kribs.

FUNERAL CHAMP CLARK SATURDAY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3.—The house of representatives had completed arrangements today for funeral services in the house chamber Saturday morning for Champ Clark.

The services, which will be held at 10:30 o'clock will be a tribute of respect such as has been paid only a few times in the history of the American congress.

The body of the former speaker will lie in state in the capitol rotunda before the services.

Both houses of congress voted to appoint committees to attend the funeral as representatives of their respective bodies.

Tonight the house will devote an hour to an eulogy to the former speaker.

YANKEE PRINCESS IS SERIOUSLY ILL

ATHENS, Mar. 2.—(By the Associated Press)—Princess Anastasia, wife of Prince Christopher of Greece, who has been violently ill of stomach trouble for several days, seemed to be in a serious condition, it was said today.

Princess Anastasia was formerly Mrs. William B. Leeds of New York. She was married to Prince Christopher in Switzerland early in 1920.

HOLY WAR ON SERBIA DENIED

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3.—Formal denial was made today by Dr. S. Y. Grouth, minister of the kingdom of the Serbs, Croats, and Slovenes, that the Montenegrins had declared a holy war on Serbia, which recently was reported from London as going on in Montenegro against Serbian troops.

the reparations conference in London, nor was there any apparent uneasiness in the Bourse. In both quarters there was a prevalent feeling that Germany's counter proposals were not fully understood by the entente leaders upon their first presentation by Dr. Simons.

Quotations on the Bourse were remarkably firm in the face of a flood of alarming reports from London and Paris of lively speculation in foreign exchange.

Lloyd George Speech

It was not noticed during the British prime minister's presentation of the allied demands that he had left an opening for the Germans to make new proposals and Dr. Simons, in making the reply he did, was prompt to take advantage of this.

Mr. Lloyd George, in the course of his long speech, said that if the Germans had come with a sincere desire to discharge Germany's obligations, the allies would have given their proposals fair and patient consideration.

If the Germans, he continued, had said that they had better ways which would be equally effective in meeting the case, then “we would have sat down with the German delegation to examine in perfect good faith their counter proposals with a view to arriving at a reasonable accord.”

Dr. Simons' reply is taken to mean that the Germans have further pro-

PARIS, Mar. 3.—Germany's deliveries applicable to the reparations account, including war material, are estimated at eight billion gold marks, it was announced by the allied reparations committee here today. This would leave twelve billion marks due on the first twenty billion marks Germany would pay under the Versailles treaty.
