ASHLAND WINS CHAMPIONSHIP IN BASKET BALL

Ashland High's basketball quintet carried off the third and deciding game of the Medford-Ashland series and virtually clinched the Southern Oregon hoop title last night when it downed the Medford squad by a 26 to 20 score on the Ashland floor. The game was fast, local men displaying the same good brand of ball shown in the game here last Saturday, but they were unable to ring baskets although they had chance after chance.

Ashland opened the game with a rush piling up a five point lead which they maintained to the half, the score board reading 6 to 11. In the second period the home men made a strong rally bringing the score at one time 18 to 20, but some fast and clever playing by the Granite City contingent swung their score to 26 where the game closed with Medford held for 20 points. For Medford Captain "Irish" Coleman played an especially aggressive game while for Ashland Herr and Guthrie were bears on the offense while Young showed class in his guarding work. The game was not marred by the customary number of fouls which contributed to making last evening's scrimmage a fast one.

Tonight will be the last chance for the Medford five to tackle the Ashlanders this season, and local adherents are hoping that the home aggregation will give their adversaries a hard battle. All who witnessed last night's mix are hoping that the same officials will handle the tonight's game, since referee Coleman and Umpire Shy Huntington were right there on the job.

The Ashland girls also won the championship of this section by defeating the Medford sextet in a 28 to 22 game. It was a hard fought battle and although the Medford girls played well, the Red and White line up was a little too much for them. The line-up for the main event was: Medford—Coleman, F. Herr, Watson, F. Guthrie, Sherwood, G. Aitkins, Young, G. Young. Referee, Coleman. Umpire, Shy Huntington.

SHANTUNG TANGLE TOPIC AT PHOENIX CHURCH SUNDAY

ASHLAND SERVICE MEN TO SUBMIT LIST OF CLAIMS

ASHLAND, March 4.—"Get busy," is the admonition to all service men, whether Legionnaires or not, this injunction applying to preliminaries as a requisite in adjusting claims in connection with services rendered in the world war. Not only information but personal assistance first hand, may be obtained of the Flying Squadron which bivouacs in Medford, on Saturday, March 5. Just how to handle requests for the "Victory Medal" will also be made known to service men, and a lot of other pertinent information will be afforded, saving much time which will otherwise be lost in securing equivalent particulars through correspondence channels. Ashland Post will expedite matters in this respect by submitting claim questionnaires for the personal consideration of the squadron, the personnel of which includes Frank Evans, service officer for the American Legion of Oregon; Dr. F. W. White, of the U. S. public health service, Seattle; Kenneth Cooper, of the Federal Vocational Board, Portland; Cliff Wood, Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Portland. Either Major Cloan or Capt. Hathaway will also be present, and a field clerk of the army establishment will accompany the contingent. Cliff Wood especially is well known to service men hereabouts, he having been identified with our local post in sending two of its members to the Oregon Agricultural college to benefit by that institution's vocational training course. The officers of Ashland Post, in view of the visit of this Flying Column, emphasize the importance to service men of having these questionnaires filled out promptly. Consequently it is expected that quite a number of these inquiries will be filed with the visiting commission at Medford on Saturday. In addition to assisting in the adjustment of specific claims, the squadron will file applications for the "Victory Medal," an award of merit which is a substantial recognition of duty well performed. A fine lithograph representation of this medal is displayed on the walls of the Ashland postoffice.

A further activity locally in connection with Legion affairs refers to the erection of a monument on an allied basis as representing veterans of several wars, notably the Civil, Spanish, and recent world struggle. The proposed tribute is to be a composite one in behalf of these several units, and the proposition is to accomplish this project the coming summer. The committee from Ashland Post includes Earl Coleman, chairman; W. M. Briggs, Fred Peniston, V. V. Mills and J. M. Spencer, who will consult with the other veteran organizations relative to appropriate designs, cost, etc., and arrange as to financing the plan.

A charter is in prospect for a woman's Auxiliary, a number having signed applications for the necessary papers.

Capt. W. M. Briggs of First Company is the organization officer for the American Legion, and in the opinion of Ashland Post No. 14, his appointment is an ideal one, and the logical one to make under existing circumstances.

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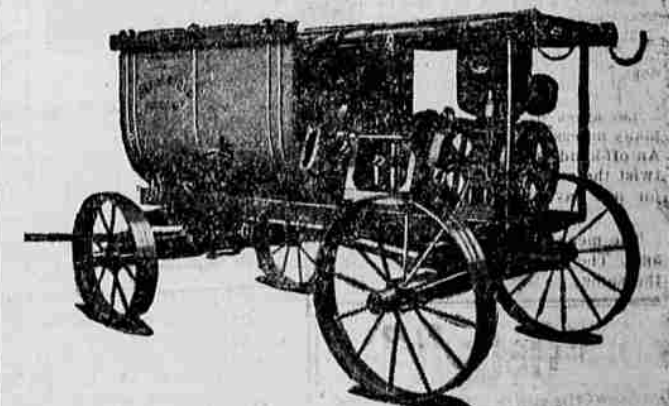
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
