HOW ABOUT HIRAM?

KEEP your eyes on Hiram Johnson. Hiram's role as good dog is over. No more tail wagging by Hiram. When President Harding appointed Charles E. Hughes as secretary of state, and Herbert Hoover, as secretary of commerce, and Teddy Roosevelt, Jr., as assistant secretary of the navy, a noisy and pestiferous can was tied to Hiram's political tail, and Hiram is not the type to pack discarded tinware amicably.

Whether the blow-up is to come at once, or later only developments can determine, but that it will come eventually, is as certain as death and taxes. The dangers lurking beneath the calm surface of party solidarity, as the Harding ship of state moves majestically out to sea, do not lie in the shoals of the democratic minority. Not for a minute. There isn't a leader on the democratic side, that need give the master pilot pause. But that little U-boat in the offing, with Hiram as chief officer, Borah and perhaps La Follette as members of the crew,—that is an entirely different matter.

Hiram is mad. And when Hiram gets mad, things are bound to happen,—heretofore things to the other man, but this time it may be to Hiram. For those who put Harding down as an amiable and insipid bowl of mush, ready to yield to the first persuasion, are due for an awakening.

If Harding had been that he would never have named the cabinet he did. The line of least resistance never came near Hughes or Hoover, and only flirted charily with T. R., Jr. The President, in fact, displayed genuine courage when he brushed the opposition aside and named Hughes. This courage was something more than a surface bravado, the selection of Hoover demonstrated, and when Roosevelt was named,—Harding's line of campaign was plain. He not only intended to meet Johnson's challenge at the outset, but he intended to so distribute his forces that Johnson's counter attack would be met before it started.

Flaying Roosevelt in the cabinet was a perfect example of a sharp offense being the best defensive strategy. All national affairs are being handled around a recalcitrant Hiram, projecting impossible.

If Johnson were an ordinary man, the battle would now be over. But he isn't. As a militant and aggressive leader, as a double-fisted, gilt edge campaigner he is without a peer in the country today. And he takes to a fight, as a duck to water.

Therefore, one may take it as a moral certainty, that when the first storm begins to gather, Johnson will be somewhere in the thick of it, with his eye on the periscope and one hand on the torpedo lever. It will be a contest worth watching. As the opposing forces are now aligned, however, it looks as though Hiram, for once in his life, would meet his master.

SILESIA TO VOTE ON REMAINING A PART OF GERMANY

RYBNIK, Upper Silesia, Mar.—Women laborers in mines and factories and on railroads are more numerous than men in several districts of the coal region here. Girls and boys of ten and 12 years are regularly employed, digging ditches, ballasting gun-ways, pushing trucks and doing other heavy work which before the war was done only by men.

This is the territory hitherto a part of Germany, but claimed now by Poland. A plebiscite, or vote of the people, must be held under the terms of the peace treaty of Versailles to determine whether Upper Silesia will remain German or become a part of Poland.

The German mine owners say shortage of labor and post-war economic conditions have forced the women and children into this toil, which under German administration was forbidden. There is also a shortage of manpower because of the great number of soldiers from here who were killed in the war.

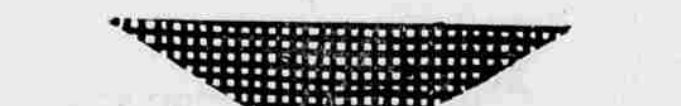
