TRIAL PHIPPS-MATTHEWS AUTO CASE STARTED

The civil suit of W. E. Phipps, a Medford lawyer, against R. A. Matthews and his wife Selma Matthews, for \$5,000 for alleged injuries received in an auto accident on Riverside avenue, on the evening of October 17th last, went on trial in the circuit court before Judge F. M. Calkins this morning.

The plaintiff alleges that on the evening of October 17, 1920, while walking on Riverside avenue with his wife and boy, he was "violently struck, rolled in the water and fifth of the street, greatly shocked, hurt, and injured; his neck and back strained, his legs bruised, his skin abraded in numerous places, one tooth knocked out, his eye glasses crushed, his umbrella broken, and his clothing torn, soiled, and discolored."

The complaint further alleges "that by reason of the negligence and carelessness of the defendants, and their inhuman conduct as aforesaid mentioned the plaintiff endured grievous mental and physical sufferings, humiliation and chagrin, and thereby endured great pain, agony and discomfort and was thereby compelled to incur large expense for medical services, dental services, and optical services and the replacement of his destroyed wearing apparel, and thereby compelled to lose much time from his vocation, all to the great damage in the sum of \$5,000."

The jury was selected as follows: T. E. Pottinger, C. C. Hartley, Elton Beeson, M. F. Young, L. H. Gregory, E. C. Stillman, Ralph Jennings, T. H. Simpson, Emil Britt, J. M. Cronmiller, Silas Fleming, and Herman Messinger.

Witnesses testified regarding the accident, including Attorney Phipps, who in a response to a question, "Where did the rain come from?" replied, "From above." The testimony showed that at the time of the accident it was raining.

The defense will begin this afternoon.

SUPPORT OREGON INDUSTRIES, IS THEME AT FORUM

A. G. Clark, manager of the Associated Industries of Portland, was the principal speaker at today's Chamber of Commerce Forum luncheon at the Hotel Holland and made his usual strong and felicitious appeal for support of Oregon industries. The speaker called attention to the fact that one of the most perfect state products was Medford catsup, and yet at his hotel in Ashland, California catsup was on the table. He called attention to this as an example of the indifference of the people, rather than any wilful desire to aid outside industries at the expense of industries of the state.

On motion of Blaine Klum, a resolution was unanimously adopted urging the board of the directors of the chamber to secure a copyright on the words of the club songs composed by Rev. D. E. Millard. Mr. Klum said the words were being used throughout the state, with only Medford changed and that this was cheating the city of some deserved publicity. A copyright would not restrict the use of the words but would compel some public acknowledgement of the source.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 9.—J. J. Biggins, federal revenue officer was acquitted of a charge of manslaughter in federal court late yesterday when Judge R. S. Bean ordered a directed verdict clearing him. Judge Bean said the prosecution had failed to prove Biggins was slayer of Robert Hedderly, who was shot when federal officers and police attempted to arrest him on a charge of making a delivery of liquor.
