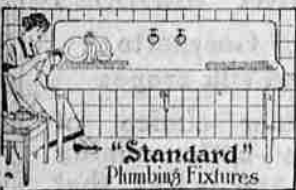

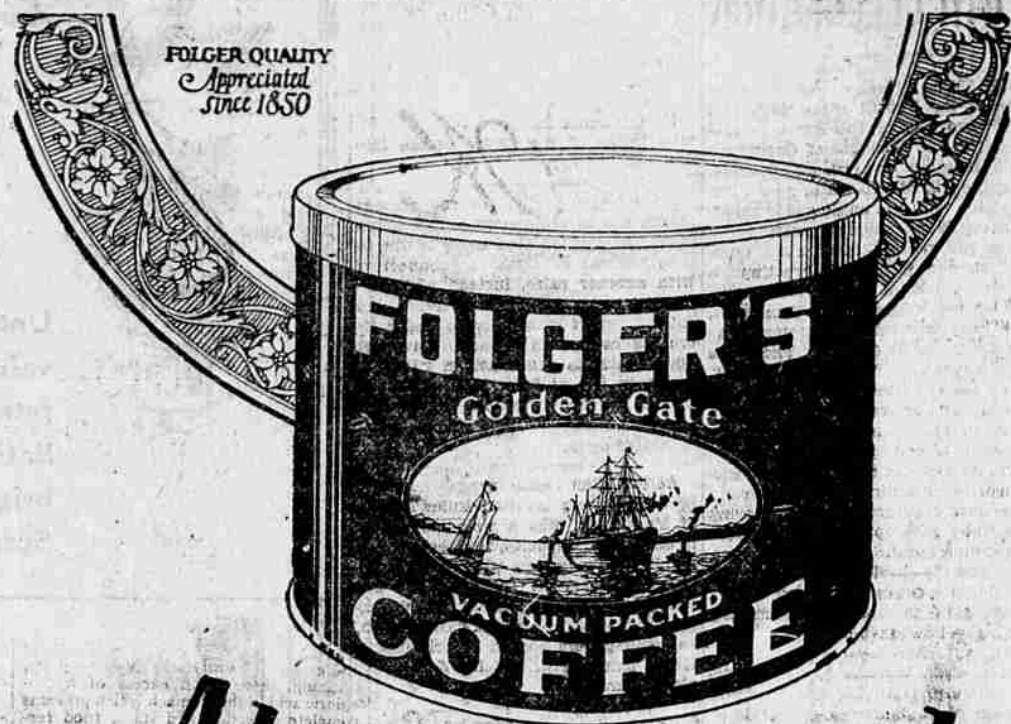
He is looking after the fish traps. Mr. Herrian and he have in Antelope near its junction with Little Butte creek.
