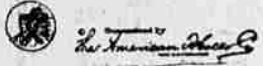

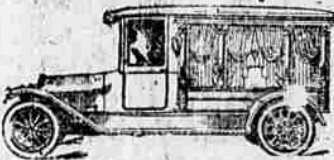

PHIPPS LOSES DAMAGE SUIT IN AUTO CASE

A jury in the civil suit of W. E. Phipps against R. A. Matthews and wife for \$5000 damages, alleged to have been received in an auto accident on Riverside avenue last October returned a verdict in favor of the defendants in five minutes Wednesday evening. The jury assessed no costs and the witness fees will be borne by each side. It is understood that Plaintiff Phipps will appeal the case to the supreme court.

A jury in the circuit court this morning was hearing the civil suit of the Howard A. Kelley Hospital vs. S. S. Bullis for \$2500 alleged to be due for radium treatment applied in 1915. R. A. Matthews, defendant in the \$5000 damage suit of Attorney W. E. Phipps for alleged injuries received in an auto accident on Riverside avenue last October, and Attorney W. E. Crews for the plaintiff engaged in a verbal tilt with high pitched voices to the point where the court admonished both to use moderation. The point at issue was whether Mr. Matthews had been negligent in notifying the authorities. Mr. Matthews was the first witness for the defense.

Mrs. Sarah Saylor, an aged woman who was riding in the back seat of the car when the accident occurred said when Attorney Phipps was hit it "sounded like a baby buggy had been hit." She also stated that Mr. Matthews, the driver of the car was blinded by the lights of an approaching car, and that Mr. Phipps cried: "Why did you do it?"

Mrs. Matthews, the third witness for the defense was also an occupant of the rear seat and testified, much of which was highly contradictory of the plaintiff's claims. She said that they offered to take "Mr. Phipps to the doctor's," but he refused. She testified she recognized Mr. Phipps "by his figure and walk" and told of efforts to locate him by phone the next day.

On cross examination by Attorney Crews Mrs. Matthews said that after the crash she asked Mr. Phipps, "What in the world are you doing in the street?"

Queried as to how far the Matthews car was from the curb, she maintained emphatically "it was eight feet because I know it was eight feet."

Homer Saylor, who picked apples for Mr. Matthews, testified that he was riding in the front seat of the car and corroborated the testimony of his mother and Mrs. Matthews. It was raining hard at the time, and that his first intimation of an accident was when he saw "something black dead ahead." Like the other three defense witnesses he refuted Mr. Phipps' claim that he was dragged by the auto.

Attorney Crews in the final argument for the plaintiff told the jury that the real damage was \$350, as proven by the testimony, but "it was for the jury to search their hearts" to find a just award for the mental anguish the plaintiff has undergone.

Attorney Neff for the plaintiff opened his argument with the comment, "that I told Judge Crews before this argument started that if it was a question of noise I was lost. Attorney Neff argued the fine points of the law upon carelessness."

LOCAL MINERS TO EXHIBIT, PORTLAND

A number of mining men have promised to make a display of minerals from this section for the International Mining congress which is to be held at Portland on April 6 to 10 and should any information be desired as to what the exhibit should consist of, they should confer with the management of the Chamber of Commerce.

STATE PRODUCTS WEEK MEDFORD, APRIL 25TH

The members of the Medford Chamber of Commerce at their forum yesterday noon recommended to the board of directors that they arrange for an "Oregon Products Week" in the near future by the appointment of committees who will take charge.

At the suggestion of A. G. Clark, manager of the Associated Industries of Oregon, the week of April 25-30 would be most acceptable as similar campaigns would then be conducted at Ashland and Grants Pass.

Among the out of town guests at the forum were A. G. Clark of Portland, J. E. Fennell of Albany, A. J. Connelley of Cleveland and W. M. Shepard of San Francisco.

CITY OF MEDFORD WINS SWEEPING VICTORY IN COURT

In the injunction suit brought by Earl H. Fehl against the mayor, city council and other city officials of Medford, Judge F. M. Calkins in circuit court handed down a decision yesterday which is an important and sweeping victory for the city. The court ruled that the city had a right under its charter to use funds of the city to purchase property upon which the city held assessment liens, despite Mr. Fehl's contentions otherwise. Fred W. Adams, city attorney, represented the city in the suit, and F. J. Newman represented the plaintiff.

The facts in the litigation are briefly as follows: Jackson county acquired title to certain lots in Medford under tax foreclosure sale, by purchase May 25, 1918, at which time the city had outstanding street, sewer and water assessments against the same property in the sum of \$2762.40. Mr. Fehl thereafter applied to the county to purchase these lots, and April 26, 1919, the county put the lots up at public sale. Mr. Fehl bidding \$400 for the lots and the city bidding \$405 for them.

Mr. Fehl contended in his suit that the city was not authorized under its charter to make the purchase and sought to restrain it from doing so. On the other hand the city contended that the authority is given it to make such purchase under the charter amendment known as the Hansen plan, and subsequent legislation by the legislature. Mr. Fehl contended that upon the sale of the lots at tax foreclosure sale, the assessments were extinguished and that the city had no liens upon the property after the county purchased it.

MANILA BANDITS KILL 4, WOUND 11

MANILA, Mar. 9.—(By Associated Press.) Four Filipinos were killed and eleven wounded by a band of mountaineers armed with bolos, who raided a cockpit three hundred miles south-east of here, according to advices reaching here today.

The band was led by Pedro Nayo, who after consuming quantities of liquor, invaded the cockpit during the progress of a cock fight.

The mountaineers, using bolos, stabbed everybody who approached while Nayo engaged in a hand-to-hand fight with native policemen. The mountaineers were finally overwhelmed by the native police and spectators, who beat the leader to death. All others of the mountaineer band escaped to the mountains, pursued by a detachment of constabulary.

EXPLORERS SEE HEAD HUNTERS IN ECUADOR

NEW YORK, Mar. 10.—Tales of head-hunting savages who worship the devil and spend their lives gathering wild animal skins to use in purchasing wives were told today by George K. Cherris, explorer, and Harold Anthony of the American Museum of Natural History, who returned from South Ecuador.

More than 2,500 specimens of rare birds and mammals were brought back by the explorers who spent eight months in the wildest and least explored forest lands.

DAVE BEARKS IS MODEL PRISONER IN PENITENTIARY

David Bearks, sentenced to 12 years in the state prison for participation in the Shinkyo freight train hold-up a year ago, as a model prisoner, according to information received by the sheriff's office from the prison warden, but D. H. McGowan and Clarence McDade, his pals in the crime, are hard boiled. Bearks' wife is employed in a Salem restaurant. Bearks has many friends in this city, who are interested in his securing a parole at the end of his minimum term, three years.

McDade, according to information received locally, is highly unruly, and in a recent smoke held at the prison, defeated Bearks in a lively bout. Bearks was a prizefighter before his employment as a brakeman on the Southern Pacific out of Ashland south, and was known in the ring as Kid West.

Another prisoner from Jackson county listed as "model" is "Red" Black. He was sentenced to three years for stealing a Chevrolet car in Medford, and while in the county jail escaped by hitting the jailer over the head with a stick of wood. He was captured several weeks afterwards in a cabin in the Steamboat district.
