

### HARDING SENDS MESSAGE OF GOOD WILL TO MANILA

MANILA, Mar. 10.—President Harding's first executive message to the Filipino was received today by the president of the senate, Manuel L. Quezon, and Speaker of the House Sergio Osmeña, in reply to their messages of congratulation.

President Harding said: "With the liveliest sense of appreciation and satisfaction I have received your congratulations upon the occasion of my inauguration, and I am pleased to reciprocate with assurance of my highest regard and concern for the welfare and prosperity of the Filipino people."

Secretary Barretto said that the time of consummation of the sale of exchange can be determined only by circumstances.

### OREGON LUMBER MEN GET TIME EXTENSION

SALEM, Ore., March 10.—Edgar E. Clark, chairman of the interstate commerce commission has advised the Oregon public service commission of an extension from six to nine months of the milling in transit privilege extended to lumber manufacturers to enable them to move their accumulated stocks to eastern markets.

The Oregon commission has been in communication with the interstate commission seeking an extension of time on the privilege as applicable to lumber stocks now held by the various transit points in Oregon.

### BEAN DISMISSES THE NARCOTIC DEFENDANTS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 10.—Manslaughter charges against Narcotics Inspector W. R. Wood, Revenue Officer Dalazon C. Smith, and Patrolmen E. M. Jackson and William D. Smith, growing out of the killing of Robert D. Heddery during a raid September 19, last, were dismissed in federal court yesterday afternoon by Judge R. S. Bean, who held the charges not proven.

### KIDNAPER IS GIVEN HELP BY WAR COMRADES

TACOMA, March 10.—An insanity commission will examine Hugh C. Van Ambrugh, confessed kidnapper of Arthur Rust, as to his sanity. Complaint that Van Ambrugh is insane was filed by his brother William.

In his complaint the brother said that he is confident that the terrible war experiences of the kidnapper unbalanced his mind. He declared Hugh to be irrational and irresponsible at times.

A committee appointed by Wild West post No. 91, Veterans of Foreign Wars today made a report, following an examination of Van Ambrugh, that he is not now mentally normal.

The war veterans feel sure there is good, honest citizenship material in Van Ambrugh, the report said, "and we will assist him in every way."

### MARION MAN IS U. S. COMPTROLLER

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10.—D. R. Crissinger of Marion, Ohio, was nominated today by President Harding to be comptroller of the currency.

### INDIAN DELEGATION CALLS ON SECY. FALL

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10.—A delegation of Indians urged upon Secretary Fall today that they be given more voice in the control of their affairs. They asked that Thomas L. Sloan of the Omaha tribe, Nebraska, president of the Society of American Indians, be made commissioner of Indian affairs and also requested that the Indians be allowed to name other officials dealing with them.

### J. OGDEN ARMOUR DENIES PACKERS WELCOME STRIKE

CHICAGO, Mar. 9.—A statement denying charges that the packers "would welcome a strike as a means of getting rid of accumulated products which now were in storage," was issued today by J. Ogden Armour, president of Armour and company. The charges were made yesterday by Dennis Lane, secretary of the Amalgamated Union of Meat Cutters and Butcher Workers of North America in commenting on wage reductions announced by the packers.

Statements that strikes or labor troubles would be welcomed by the meat packers as an aid to disposing of big accumulations of meat are wholly erroneous, Mr. Armour said. He declared the bulk of American meat consumption is of fresh meat and that the government's March report showed cold storage of meat, lard, etc., was a billion pounds less than for the corresponding month last year.

(Continued from Page One) ing part." Secretary Weeks said today and a similar attitude as to the Rhine situation growing out of the occupation of additional German cities by the allies was expressed at the state department.

No additional instructions have been sent to Major General Allen, commanding the American forces, it was said, and no inquiries have been made of the allied governments regarding the reparation sanctions to be imposed upon Germany.

American troops, it was pointed out, occupy their position in Germany under the terms of the armistice and not for the fulfillment of the treaty of Versailles. Consequently it was considered unlikely that the state department would approve any plan by which they would assist in making the proposed tariff barrier around Germany effective.

CHICAGO, March 10.—Another murder, the third in three days, in the nineteenth ward, which recently was the scene of several bombings during a bitter aldermanic campaign, was revealed to the police today when three workmen found the body of a man under the elevated railway.

### MEXICO OBJECTS TO INFUX OF YANK WORKERS

MEXICO CITY, Mar.—An influx of American labor to Mexico, especially to the oil regions, is causing much concern to the government officials, who are receiving complaints daily from Mexican workmen's organizations that the presence of the foreigners is working a hardship on native labor.

It is asserted that unemployment in the United States has caused thousands of Mexicans to return to the republic, many of them in destitute circumstances. Arriving here they find large numbers of Americans holding the jobs which they declare, rightfully belong to them.

TEXARKANA, Texas, March 10.—A man who gave his name as A. Hall, of Little Rock, third of a trio of alleged swindlers, who yesterday mulcted H. W. Black of Portland, Ore., of \$12,975 in a fake stock market deal, was arrested today after Black had identified the man.

### SPARKS FROM TODAY'S WIRE

BERLIN, Mar. 10.—Resignation of the Prussian cabinet was announced today. The present Prussian cabinet was formed March 29 last with Herr Braun as premier.

OMAHA, Neb., Mar. 10.—John Berg, 54, farmer living near Omaha, was shot and instantly killed today when he walked into a gun trap set in his hen coop to catch chicken thieves.

NEW YORK, Mar. 10.—Directors of the Phelps Dodge corporation, copper producers, today declared a quarterly dividend of \$1 a share, compared with the previous rate of \$2.50 a share.

SALT LAKE CITY, Mar. 10.—Utah will lend her moral force to the support of the world's exposition commemorating the resumption of peace to be held in Portland, Oregon, in 1925, according to a resolution passed by the senate today.

### FRANCE NOW IN GERMANY'S PLACE IN POTASH FIELD

NEW YORK, Mar.—The potash mines of Alsace, which before the war were operated by the Germans, but now are under French control, have been restored to working order and France has again become a rival of Germany in the world's markets as a producer of this fertilizing agent, say French agents here. Prior to the war, the Germans controlled virtually the only source of the world's supply of potash and while the great conflict was in progress, farmers everywhere suffered from lack of it.

With the restoration of Alsace to France, French engineers began the work of restoring the mines to activity and after two years of effort, now announce that new machinery has been installed, the extraction shafts repaired and refining plants put in working order.

### MAYOR BAKER WANTS A SOLDIER MONUMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., March 10.—A movement to obtain from the government as a gift the old postoffice site bounded by Morrison, Yamhill, Sixth and Fifth streets, as a park in which the city would erect a shaft in memory of Oregon soldiers who died in the world war was started today by Mayor George L. Baker.

There have been rumors that the government intended to dispose of the site by sale for business property, and Mayor Baker said it would be more appropriate to dedicate the ground to Oregon's war heroes.


