ASHLAND HOST TO OHIO SOCIETY ON SAT., MARCH 12

ASHLAND, Mar. 11.—Sons and daughters of old Ohio will boost Buckeyedom on Saturday, March 12, in this city. The reunion will be held at Chautauqua Pioneer hall, within the walls of which most of the hospitable gatherings of the present day are finding convenient quarters and a welcome greeting. This observance is not a local one exclusively, inasmuch as the Rogue River Valley association as to membership includes a wide extent of territory. Nominally the annual event marks the anniversary of Ohio's admission into the union. According to history there is a little divergence of opinion as to the exact date when this event occurred, but the variance is merely technical, and the association goes ahead year after year and celebrates the epoch at a date most convenient to all concerned. Whether Ohioans are more loyal than the natives of other states is a question, but the fact remains that they are more enthusiastic in observing the traditions of their glorious old commonwealth than the denizens of other sections. The Ohio society has been in existence fourteen years, and if a single year has been omitted as to the annual observance of admission day, we do not know it. Once upon a time Wisconsin day was observed locally. Then Iowa came to the front with a Hawkeye celebration, which lasted three or four years, incidental to which corn, cattle and hogs, also the goldenrod, were extolled, all of which is now but a faded memory. Rivalry among the Kansas folks then started up, and for a year or two every other resident hereabouts was tagged with a sunflower, blouses which have long since wilted.

Dinner, according to Buckeye established methods of cookery, will be served at 12 o'clock noon, sharp. The repast will be a picnic one, hence all are admonished to bring well filled baskets. After-dinner events are included in a diversified literary and musical program. Attorney H. A. Canaday, of Medford, will be the speaker of the day, and there will be informal talks from a number of others. J. J. Chambers, of this city, is president of the association, and Mrs. Chambers is secretary. Ohio will still have to take off its hat to Virginia as being the "Mother of presidents," even with Harding in the chief executive's chair the representation by states being seven to eight respectively in the presidential score. A number of enthusiastic Buckeyes have been claiming that

honors were easy in this respect, but an official roll call reveals the following status: Ohio—Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Ben Harrison, McKinley, Taft, Harding; Virginia—Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, "Tippecanoe" Harrison, Tyler, Taylor, Wilson.

All native sons and daughters of Ohio and their families are eligible to attend these reunions, and a cordial invitation is extended.

Medford Minstrels, under Ellis auspices, will appear at the Vining, in Ashland, on Friday evening, March 11, after a successful tour both at home and abroad. One of the troupe's entertainments in the home town was known as "Ashland Night" at the Page, and in this instance the aggregation visits this city direct, in response to a hearty invitation to play on our home grounds, hoping that their appearance here may not prove to be "The lay of the last minstrel." A rousing welcome awaits the jolly visitors.

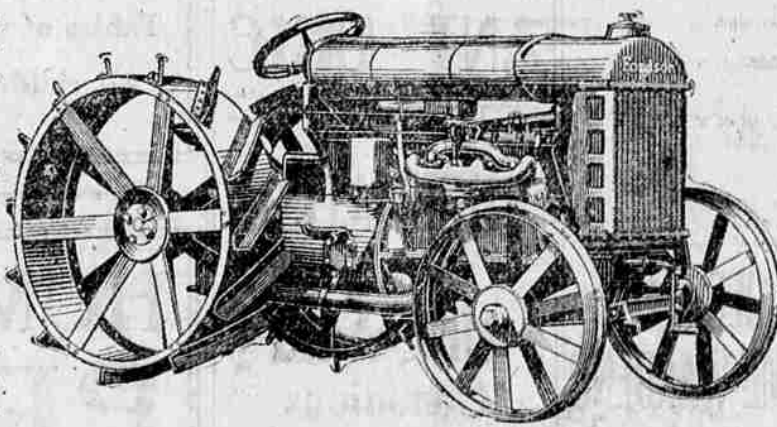
