In 1912 the precipitation was much larger, being 24.83 inches, but it was not distributed evenly.

"There is little or no foundation to an article published in Medford papers this week to the effect that Jacksonville citizens intended instituting suit against the state board of bank examiners for the recovery of money lost in the collapse of the Bank of Jacksonville," says the Jacksonville Post.
