Y. M. C. A. PLANS TO ESTABLISH A BASEBALL LEAGUE. Medford Y. M. C. A. is making plans for a comprehensive program of baseball for the opening of the season. The board of directors met yesterday for lunch and discussion of details. What is planned for is a twilight league of half a dozen teams representing the churches of the city. There will be a league for seniors as well as for juniors, the age limit for the latter being under fifteen, while from the show of interest at present the older league bids fair to be composed of the old "has-beens" and erstwhile "near ball players" of a generation ago.
