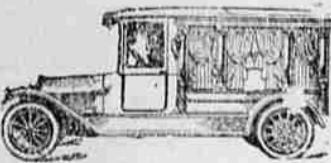

WHEAT CROP NEAR OREGON LINE HIT BY FLOOD WATER

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Mar. 17.—Traffic on the interurban line between this city and Milton-Freewater, Ore., was suspended this morning because of high water in Mill creek and the Walla Walla river. Officials of the company were afraid that a bridge spanning the creek just west of the city had been so undermined as to make it unsafe. Another bridge across the river was also considered dangerous. The abutments of several bridges in the city have been undermined and traffic across them has been cut off by the city authorities.

Reports coming in from the rural districts are piling up the financial loss and no attempt has as yet been made to even hazard a guess as to the total. Wheat fields in the foothills of the Blue mountains east of the city have been badly washed and it may be necessary to plow and re-seed, because of the great gullies which have been cut in the slopes. On farmer stated over the telephone that his fields were cut from six to eight feet deep in some places.

The waters spread from the banks of the streams over the flat lands and hundreds of head of stock were marooned.

Sport Briefs

Manager Tris Speaker of the world's champion Cleveland Americans registered his first home run of the season in a practice game yesterday at Hubbard, Texas.

Stanislav Zhyzsko meets Joe Vargo of Cleveland in a finish wrestling match tonight in the Ohio city. They are heavyweights.

The first game in the world's championship chess tournament at Havana, Cuba, between Dr. Emanuel Laskar, the German champion and Jose Capablanca, Cuban title-holder was declared a draw after the fiftieth move. Play continues today.

The batting of Tierney and Rohwer and the pitching of Yellowhorse, the Indian moundsman featured the first practice game staged by the Pirates at the Hot Springs camp yesterday. Tierney, playing second with the regulars, connected with two home runs in three times at bat, while Rohwer, former University of California star at first for the second string team, was credited with one circuit clout.

Bing Miller and Dick Brotten, the two players awarded the Washington Senators by Judge Landis in his decision against the Pittsburgh Nationals, have arrived at Tampa, completing the Washington roster.

Earl Sheely, 1920 batting champion of the Pacific Coast league, who finished the season with an average of .373, 31 home runs and 51 doubles, has reported at the Chicago White Sox camp at Waxahachie, Texas. He will be tried out at first by Manager Gleason.

Harry Greb outpointed Jack Renault of Montreal in ten rounds last night at Pittsburgh.

Johnny Wilson of Boston, middle-weight champion, tonight in New York will meet Mike O'Dowd, of St. Paul, against whom he won a decision giving him the title last May at Boston. The bout is scheduled for 15 rounds to a decision.

Welker Cochran and Edouard Horemans, Belgian billiard champion, have been matched for an 18.2 ball line match next week at New York. The match will be at 4,500 points in blocks of 400. Cochran defeated Horemans in a 3,600 point match at Detroit last week.

HAMON CASE GONE TO JURY

gold has lined the pocket of a juror," Mathers said regarding the state.

Tolled for Hamon. Mr. Mathers said he was assured that the jury would "not weigh out so many tears of the defendant against so many ounces of Jake Hamon's gold," in reaching their verdict.

"This defendant tolled and flayed to aid in accumulating Jake Hamon's millions," the attorney said, "and now they are bringing the pressure of money she helped gain to prosecute her."

"You know it as well as I that the testimony in the case has partly been perjured," the attorney charged. "The suit of clothes which it was testified was worn by Hamon at the time of his shooting was not that one introduced in evidence."

ARDMORE, Okla., Mar. 17.—An effort of the defense to waive their right of argument and have the case of Clara Smith Hamon, on trial charged with the murder of Colonel Jake L. Hamon, republican national committeeman from Oklahoma, go immediately to the jury, was ruled out by Judge Thomas W. Champion this morning and defense counsel began its plea for acquittal of the defendant.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Mar. 17.—Official count of the first hundred ballots in the packing house strike vote taken yesterday, showed ninety-eight in favor of a walkout and two opposed, the union officials announced today.

FRANCE A GOOD LOSER IN 1870 SPITE OF LOSSES

PARIS, March.—The French press has been comparing the attitude of France regarding payment of the \$10,000,000,000 indemnity asked by Germany after the Franco-Prussian war in 1870 with that of the German nation now facing its bills for the world's war.

The Journal des Debats republishes a letter written to that paper in February, 1872, by Hippolyte Taine, in which the famous French historian suggested that "every Frenchman surrender one-thirtieth of his revenue in order that Germany might be paid sooner."

Taine proposed that every Frenchman, whether rich or poor, workingman or bourgeois, could make this sacrifice to his country. He declared that a workmanman by devoting one day's pay each month; a manufacturer by surrendering the one-thirtieth part of his net income; the farmer by giving up the thirtieth bushel of oats, corn or wheat as the case might be, would permit France to pay its then fabulous indemnity two years sooner than required and end the occupation.

The historian had figured that the amount realized from his scheme would reach 500,000,000 francs per year.

The Journal des Debats commenting says: "Germany has the example of a people which on the morrow of defeat seeks to liberate itself of its debt although that people had committed no depredations, caused no damage to the territory of its enemy."

Finance Crater Lake Hotel

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar.—The International Fly and Bait Casting Championship Tournament which will be held here September 3 to 5, will be the biggest event of its kind ever held, in number of events and prizes, according to officers of the Multnomah Anglers club, who have arrangements in charge.
