FLOOD WATERS NORTHERN IDAHO CAUSE DAMAGE

SPOKANE, March 18.—Reports of flood conditions and rising rivers which it was feared might cause widespread damage were received here from northern Idaho and eastern Washington towns today.

At Pottlatch, Idaho, the North Plouise river was said to have carried out one dam early today, and another dam with three to four million feet of logs was expected to break.

At Palouse, Wash., below Pottlatch, parts of the town were under water and property had been removed from low ground in anticipation of the flood which would follow the breaking of the Pottlatch dam.

Jullietta and Sand Point, Idaho, also reported high water, but with little damage.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., March 18.—Waters in Mill creek and other streams of the valley are falling fast and all danger of further damage is considered past. As the waters fall much damage is being disclosed and it is estimated that \$100,000 will come a long way from covering the losses in this city.

Bridge abutments have been undermined in the city and several railroad bridges in the county have been badly weakened. Trains on the Dayton branches of the O. W., and the N. P., are not running through because a bridge across the Touchet river on both lines had been so badly weakened as to make them unsafe.

The flood waters of Mill creek broke out of the banks at a new place Thursday night when they rose rapidly following the second heavy downpour in the hills and inundated another section of the city flooding cellars and causing considerable damage.

Mayor Ben F. Hill and Street Commissioner Grov Cockerly are not tabulating the damages to city property and bulkheads which must be replaced and both stated today that they believed it would exceed the figures mentioned.

LOGGER ADMITS MURDER IN 1918

TACOMA, Mar. 18.—Claud W. Blackman, a logger who has been working near Shelton, walked into the city police department last evening and announced that he killed his uncle, Bethel Blackman, in Wood county, Texas, on October 22, 1918.

A telegram received by Chief Harry Smith from A. Jolly, sheriff of the Texas county this morning verified the confession.

"Claud Blackman is wanted in Wood county for murder of Bethel Blackman in 1918. Will come for him at once," Sheriff Jolly said.

The logger promised today to return to Texas without extradition papers.

ZAMORA, NOTED MEXICAN BANDIT, DIES FROM WOUND

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 18.—Pedro Zamora, one of the most formidable bandits on the western coast of Mexico, is dead as a result of wounds received in a recent battle with federal troops near the town of Zemoantla, state of Jalisco.

The dead bandit was associated with various revolutionary factions for years. He was also a lieutenant of Villa after which he joined Zapata but finally operated independently in the states of Jalisco, Michoacan and Colima.

Last August he raided the towns of Autlan and Quatlan, from which he carried off a number of captives, among them being several Americans and several British subjects. It was said that sixteen girls carried off from Quatlan had committed suicide following their capture by the bandit. Most of his prisoners were released voluntarily and when government troops pressed the pursuit of the bandit he released the rest after being promised immunity from arrest.

He announced he intended to follow peaceful pursuits, but, unlike his former chieftain, Villa, he was not contented with a peaceful life and several days ago it was reported that he was again heading a rebellion and federal troops were sent against him. The bandit forces were encountered at Zemoantla and Zamora received fatal wounds. He managed to escape from the field but he died later.

EUROPEAN PAPERS SWALLOW FREAK AMERICAN ITEMS

THE HAGUE, Mar.—Readers of the Dutch and other European newspapers these days frequently get the idea that various state legislatures in the United States are conducted along the lines of slapstick comedies.

Each bit of freak legislation, whether introduced with serious intent or merely to cause a laugh, which emanates from these various state governing bodies, is printed with all seriousness on this side of the Atlantic.

If a senator in a state legislature decides to make the bill of a political opponent appear ridiculous by introducing another along the same lines that goes the opponent's one better and is utterly preposterous, the purport of the bill is called abroad by a European correspondent in New York and is reprinted, throughout Europe.

These dispatches are generally featured or played up in the European press, and many European editors have told the correspondent they are convinced, by the dispatches they receive, that most American lawmakers are crazy.

The fact that these measures are merely introduced and have little, if any possibility of passing, is seldom reported, with the result that many European newspaper readers are convinced that here and there in America, there are places where, for example, persons are sentenced to live several months with their mothers-in-law if found guilty of snoring.

PAYS INCOME TAX WITH 2 JITNEYS

TACOMA, Mar. 18.—A total of 148,600 residents of Washington and Alaska have filed income tax returns, David J. Williams, collector of internal revenue for the district announced today. The number of persons filing returns showed an increase over last year, but the amount collected is considerably less, Mr. Williams said. Over \$8,000,000 was received, mostly covering first quarterly payments. A part of the reduction is attributed to the ruling that a husband and wife, owning community property under the state law, may file separate returns where the income is more than \$5000.
