IRRIGATION BONDS ON SALE IN CITY

Mr. Jack M. Corbett of the United Trust company of Spokane arrived in Medford yesterday for the purpose of making preliminary plans for the opening of trust offices in this city for the Union Trust company of Spokane and Bradford Weeden & company of San Francisco.

In discussing the activities of these institutions, Mr. Corbett stated that the city of Medford and tributary country had long occupied an enviable position in financial circles on account of the richness of the community at large and the high average of individual wealth.

"It is fitting," Mr. Corbett stated, "that the initial bond offering to investors of this community should consist of bonds of Medford Irrigation District whose unquestionable worth and high character is well known to all residents of the valley. The fertility of the soil, its adaptability to irrigation, its sufficiency and permanency of water supply and all legal questions of the district have been investigated and approved by the Se-

curities commission of the state of Oregon, which formal approval, certified on each bond by the secretary of state, makes these securities lawful investments for banks, trust and insurance companies and legal collateral for public moneys deposited, and being bonds issued by a municipality, the interest received therefrom is exempt from the federal income tax."

Mr. Corbett stated that many inquiries had already been received from residents of the district, and that allotment of bonds for this community would be quickly also made.

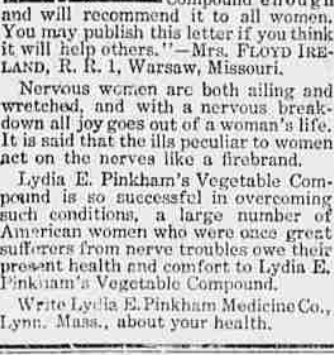
