GEN'L LIGGETT, HERO OF ARGONNE RETIRES A HATER OF ALL WAR

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 21.—Major General Hunter Liggett, commander of the first American army in the world war, retired today as an active army officer after forty-two years of service. A group of officials of the sixth army corps, his last command in the army and civilian friends witnessed General Liggett's retirement. The retiring service was simple.

consisting only in the reading of a telegram from the war department notifying General Liggett he had been relieved of army duty with the rank of major general. The telegram also advised that Brigadier General Richard M. Blatchford, commander at Camp Lewis and ranking officer in the ninth corps area, would be in command of the area pending further orders.

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar.—Major General Hunter Liggett, who retired from the army today, cannot say which was the more thrilling of the two supreme moments of his life. The first came in the Big Horn country of Wyoming in 1880 when a grizzly bear he was stalking rose from a clump of brush within three feet of him and gave him but a few seconds to figure a way out. He used one of the seconds to bring his cavalry carbine into action and it proved sufficient. The second big moment came when he was named to direct command of the biggest single army in history, the first American army in France.

Despite General Liggett's amazing courage and indifference in the hardships of the World War, he is inclined to think, he says, that the bear thrill was the greater, because it brought him closer to death than any other event of his career.

"I thought I was hunting that grizzly," he said. "But it developed that we were hunting each other. He just rose and squared off in front of me and in five seconds I would have been

a dead one if I had not blazed away with the carbine. He gave me just room enough to shoot."

The incident occurred when General Liggett, then a young infantry officer, was helping clear western plains of Indian raiders, the Sioux being chief offenders. Occasionally friendly Cheyenne Indians aided the troops as scouts and often food supplies ran low.

Once when meat rations gave out Liggett and Brave Wolf, a Cheyenne brave, crawled on hands and knees through a herd of panting, snorting bison until they reached the middle where they sat back to back and shot animals until a sufficient number was disposed of and they saw their way to safety. General Liggett believes the bison must have thought the men were wolves.

Great Feat of War. General Liggett is the first of what might be termed the American high command in the world war to retire. His achievements overseas were written large in the war's annals, from October, 1917, when he arrived in France ahead of his division, the 41st, which he had trained in America, until July, 1919, when he returned. From the division his command swelled until it included 1,200,000 men, including five French divisions and more than 5000 guns. A maneuver that led to his promotion to lieutenant-general was the clearing of the Argonne forest and the forced retirement of the enemy north of the Grand Pre Gap. It was called the war's greatest piece of major tactics.

Arguments as to who won the war would not be complete without considering the feat General Liggett performed when he became a lieutenant-general. On November 1, 1918, he launched his entire first army against the Crown Prince's forces, broke the center of the German line and pushed forward to Sedan's outskirts, forcing the crossing of the Meuse and trapping the flower of the German army. Only the armistice saved the enemy from annihilation. The general ended his active war campaigning when he assumed command of the Third American Army after its advance into Germany to fulfill surrender terms. General Liggett, while overseas, visited the field of Waterloo and marveled at the small amount of territory covered in the fighting. At one time he had his headquarters in a room from which General Petain previously had directed the defense of Verdun.

A War Hater. The general came out of the war a sincere war-hater and an advocate of universal military training. He is considering writing on these subjects. "No country will attack the United States if we have 6,000,000 or so

young men who can drop their peace tanks and shoulder and shoot a gun, especially if these men desire peace most of all," he said.
