General Wood's Appeal.

To the Editor:

The following appeal is from Major General Leonard Wood, Secretary of the Navy Theodore Roosevelt, Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, Samuel Gompers and others:

While this appeal is for the Near East alone, I am sure it will be read by the state in the light of the joint appeal which we are making for both the Chinese and the Near East sufferers.

"The spirit of Easter is one of sacrifice. The great sacrifice of Biblical history was made then. That sacrifice has been made since in many lands by many individuals. But never in history has a whole nation made the sacrifice for the faith that the Armenians have made. It is not 'none of our business' what happens to the Armenians. They stand for a stubbornness in what they believe—and what we believe—that makes their struggle our struggle. We can no more refuse to help them than we could let one of our divisions holding a sector in the late war be cut to pieces when we had the reserves to save it."

"We have the reserves of food and money and all of it. We can do the job—do all of it. We can do it ourselves, without being told to do it by anybody, in any company of nations. It is not a political duty, or a matter of commercial expediency. It is an opportunity—an opportunity to make our idealism a dynamic influence in the world, not just fine phrases. The man who has least among us more than most in Armenia."

It is one of the finest things in our history that, through the Near East Relief, the American people, from the richest to the poorest, unsolicited, have kept a hundred and ten thousand children in Armenia from hunger and death; have saved a whole people from annihilation, and have done it without fanfares or self-righteousness.

"I, and the American men and women who sign with me, ask that this work go on. It is an American work and in harmony with the best traditions of our big-hearted American generosity. It cannot fatter or pause."

Trusting you may find space for General Wood's message.

WHY A COMMUNITY CHEST?

UNLESS there is a sudden clarification of the atmosphere, the Community Chest proposition promises to be defeated through a misapprehension. This misapprehension is that a vote against the Community Chest is a vote against charitable drives and a defeat of the measure means an end to solicitation.

As a matter of fact, the reverse is true. Defeat of the Community Chest will merely mean a continuation of the present practice, which has become so unpopular, namely uncontrolled solicitation, from every source. For the opponents of the Community Chest have offered no substitute for a discredited system, which is bound to be continued unless some new method like that of the Community Chest is adopted.

While we desire to hurt no one's feelings, it seems to us, that the affirmative argument for the Community Chest has missed the main point in favor of the plan. This is its greater economy. What the average citizen is interested in, is the adoption of some plan, which will eliminate these perpetual drives, and reduce the drain upon the pocket book.

A community chest, under the proper control and regulation, will do just this. It will require but one drive, it will by the elimination of time, duplication of effort, etc., cut down the overhead, so that more money will go directly to those in need of help, and less to keep the machinery of solicitation in motion.

No one can seriously expect Medford to escape all charitable obligations. No one familiar with the law, believes, public funds can be devoted toward private benefits. What Medford does in a charitable way must be done by voluntary contribution, and Medford like every other community, must do something.

No plan can be perfect. But the Community Chest plan has succeeded elsewhere, and there is every reason to believe it will succeed here. It promises with the same amount of money, to accomplish more, at less annoyance to the individual, and with the burden more widely and equitably distributed.

If this point had been brought out in the affirmative argument, more clearly, there would be less danger of the defeat of the Community chest through a general public misapprehension.
