**ASHLAND VOTES ON COMMUNITY CHEST SATURDAY**

ASHLAND, March 23.—"Shall we revert to the community chest plan?" and "shall we celebrate three days?" are two propositions which are being submitted to citizens in general by the Chamber of Commerce through referendum measures, voting returns to be held in by Saturday, March 26. Under the "war chest" system formerly in vogue in this community, it is familiar history how the Red Cross and allied relief measures were speedily financed without recourse to so many specific campaign drives. But the community chest ceased functioning not long after the armistice, with the result that its one-on-a-time abundant coffers are empty in the face of numerous appeals for deserving causes. An empty chest, however, witnessed success achieved in raising quotas for the children's Farm Home, European Relief, and Albertina Kerr Nursery, but these appeals involved separate and distinct drives as of yore. Hence with a Salvation Army quota to raise early in May, and several other projects in view, many think that the community chest plan is the best one to return to, as involving the best financial returns at the minimum of work and worry. Although citizens in general are not only privileged but urged to vote on the question, a specific ballot will be prepared for use of Chamber of Commerce members. Thus it remains to be seen what the outcome will be in the way of voting as a commercial organization, in view of the circumstance that a test on a similar proposition submitted by the Medford chamber resulted in a tie vote, 53 to 53 out of a membership of nearly 400, general apathy over the merits of the plan having been exhibited. The three day celebration proposition may call out a full vote, more being interested, for the time being at least, in that annual holiday event.
