

PRES. JOHNSON'S TAILOR SHOP TO BE STATE RELIC

NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 24.—A dilapidated little building at Greenville, in Eastern Tennessee, upon the front of which once hung the sign: "A. Johnson, Tailor," and which was the place where Andrew Johnson, the man who succeeded Lincoln as president of the United States, began his business career, probably will be bought and preserved by the state of Tennessee.

A bill now is pending in the Tennessee legislature providing for the purchase of the building and its maintenance as a state relic. Its picture has adorned Tennessee histories for years, but the commonwealth has been slow to take steps to preserve the building.

The little tailor shop stands at the corner of East Depot and College streets in the sleepy little town where Johnson, who was born in Raleigh, N. C., emigrated at the age of 18. Having served his apprenticeship to a tailor, Johnson opened his first shop in Greenville. After a year he was married to Miss Eliza McCordell to whose lot it fell to teach her young husband to write and to undertake other educational preliminaries as Johnson knew only his letters when he became head of his own house, having never attended school a day in his life.

Johnson's political career began as alderman of Greenville. He then served as mayor, was elected to the lower house of the legislature, then state senator, afterward to congress, became governor of Tennessee serving two terms, United States senator, military governor of Tennessee, was elected as vice president of the United States and became president upon the death of Lincoln. His final political office was that as United States senator from Tennessee.

POLAND IS NOW AFTER FLEET TO PLY THE 7 SEAS

WARSAW, March 24.—Polish statesmen are trying to find a way to build up a fleet of merchant vessels to ply the seven seas. Pushed back from the salt water when Poland lost her independence and was partitioned by Prussia, Russia and Austria, the new republic, by the treaty of Versailles, was granted an outlet to the Baltic.

The Polish government is aiding the private concerns to finance the operation of several vessels plying chiefly between English, French and Holland ports. Other firms are extending the service to America.

Poland's ministry of war has just purchased four monitors as the foundation of the Vistula fleet. Six torpedo boats, assigned to Poland by the council of ambassadors, formerly having been a part of Germany's forces, are now undergoing repairs in England.

A navy bureau of the Ministry of Trade and Industry has been formed by the Polish government and a naval school has been established at Tcheb, or Tezew (Polish spelling) on the Vistula, just outside the limits of the free city of Danzig. The course of the academy is to be conducted along lines of modern English naval schools, an English naval mission having spent some time in Poland assisting the new government in inaugurating its program.

JERUSALEM, March 24.—Bandits have flourished in the Holy Land as well as in other parts of the world since the beginning of the war. The police are now trying to put an end to their activities.

Abdul Hadi Kaha, the notorious outlaw leader, who is said to have several murders to his own personal credit, was shot and killed at Zichron Jacob recently while attempting with several companions to escape arrest.

FOREIGN TRADE REPORT SHOWS BIG LOSS IN FEBRUARY

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Trade with Europe and South America decreased sharply last month as compared with February a year ago, figures issued today by the department of commerce disclosed. February imports from Europe aggregated \$55,005,226 compared with \$106,655,718 in 1920 while exports totalled \$241,793,255 against \$384,052,168 a year ago.

For the eight months period imports from Europe were 0676,587,289 against \$732,179,927 in 1920 and exports \$2,682,593,291 compared with \$3,354,639,150 last year.

Imports from South America for February totalled \$26,599,197 compared with \$67,763,247 a year ago and exports \$38,894,180 against \$40,449,955. For the eight months, imports from South America amounted to \$379,924,708 against \$567,114,595 while exports totalled \$438,582,488 compared with \$285,399,946 last year.

Imports from Asia during February totalled \$42,122,790 compared with \$117,912,990 and exports \$58,499,578 against \$68,585,025. Imports from Great Britain \$19,069,437, compared with \$41,991,049 for the month and exports \$93,450,495 against \$169,124,828. Imports from France were \$11,578,252 against \$12,678,431 and exports \$20,432,478 compared with \$65,520,067. Imports from Germany \$4,952,278 compared with \$2,881,559 and exports \$39,619,719 against \$18,598,807. Imports from Japan \$11,711,394 compared with \$43,224,813 and exports \$22,028,539 against \$34,884,186. Imports from Argentina \$5,315,980 compared with \$15,104,410 and exports \$16,441,443 against \$11,612,237. Imports from Brazil \$9,829,131 against \$17,324,752 and exports \$1,249,074 compared with \$10,443,923. Imports from hills \$4-

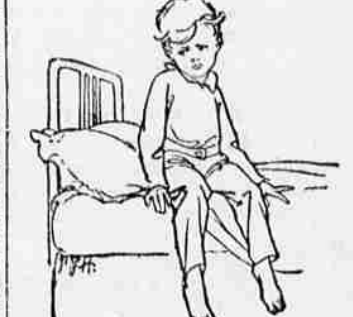
OLD PIONEER COMPOSES SONG

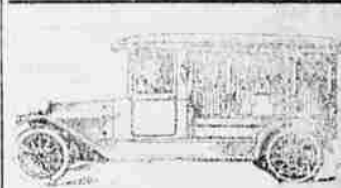
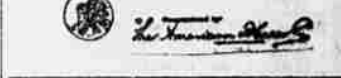
