FARMERS PERFECT BIGGEST SELLING PLAN IN HISTORY

CHICAGO.—Farmers' organizations of the United States today are officially considering the most extensive cooperative marketing plans in the history of the country.

Two well developed projects for handling grain already have been worked out and are now being presented to farmers. If adopted, they will go into effect this summer. Efforts are being made to unite the two farm groups concerned on a single system.

The final ratification meeting for the broader of the plans, which includes the handling of all grain, is set for April 6 here. The other organization, which concerns itself only with wheat is already signing up members.

On April 7 the first working meeting of a national livestock marketing committee will be held here. Its object is to develop a national livestock marketing plan.

Coincidentally with these two meetings, fruit growers of the country will hold a conference in Chicago, at which consideration will be given the possibility of national cooperative effort.

The national plans for marketing of wheat and livestock are the culmination of much local and sectional cooperative enterprise already established by farmers.

The prime movers in the plans mentioned are the American Farm Bureau Federation and the Wheat Growers' association of America. Both organizations are developments of the last few years.

The "wheat strike" of last year first attracted attention to the Wheat Growers' association, which has its headquarters at Wichita, Kan. With the assistance of Aaron Sapiro, a California marketing expert, it has worked out a system and is pushing a contract campaign in the wheat raising states. In Kansas effort is being made to sign up 50,000,000 bushels, or about half the crop, in a wheat pool.

The general grain and livestock marketing plans are those in which the American Farm Bureau Federation has taken the lead. The federation was permanently organized only a year ago, on the foundation of the county farm bureaus, already long established.

The grain marketing plan, which has the federation's support and is to be presented to farmers in the various states between now and April 6, is the outcome of six months' work. It was drawn up by farmers and other experts under a committee of 17 with C. H. Gustafson, of Lincoln, Neb., chairman. As head of a big cooperative organization of farmers in Nebraska, Mr. Gustafson has already made a success in this field.

The livestock committee appointed by the American Farm Bureau Federation to devise a national livestock marketing plan starts with the same aim as the federation's grain committee, but as it was created later it is just getting into its labors at the present time. This is called the "Committee of Fifteen."

BUYER'S STRIKE IN PORTUGAL IS TAKEN FROM U. S.

LISBON.—The Portuguese are attempting to follow the example of the Americans and force a decline in the excessive prices of food and clothing by refusing to purchase. The people are indignant at the continued advance of the cost of the necessities of living, particularly the price of codfish, which is the chief article of food for the poorer families.

The city councils of Lisbon and Oporto are attempting to stop the exactions of the profiteers by purchasing large quantities of codfish from Newfoundland and selling it at one-third the price extorted from the public by shopkeepers. It is hoped that this will bring down not only the price of fish but that of meat.

The newspapers exhort the public to refrain from buying rice in order to bring down the price and announcements have been made of several cuts to come in that food.

The Portuguese public is looking to the United States to rescue them from their plight. Unverified rumors have been circulated that shiploads of foodstuffs, clothing and shoes are on their way from America to flood the markets here at prices available to all. Many householders are refusing to buy at present prices, saying, "I will wait until the American ships have come."

UNIVERSAL MAN SUFFRAGE FAILS IN JAPAN DIET

TOKYO.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Nothing can be more miserably disappointing, says the Nishi-Nichi than the fate in the diet of the bill for universal man suffrage. In this respect, the journal thinks the suffrage movement bears a strong resemblance to the demonstration started some 30 years ago by the Christ party in England.

It continues: "The bill for universal suffrage was slain. But it is the one proposed by political parties that was shattered. The bill in the hand of the mass of the people will, nevertheless, force itself on the government at every opportunity until it is realized. The failure of the bill in the hands of political parties was due to the wrong policy of the Kenseikai, which not only made a mess of the bill itself, but introduced a serious chasm in the very foundations of the party, in the form of the expulsion of Yukio Osaki, one of the party leaders."

The Jiji thinks that the regret is not so much at the failure of the bill itself as at the disgracefully poor show that Kenseikai made in consequence of lack of unity and prudence. It was the Kenseikai that gave birth to the universal man suffrage project, but it was also the same party that killed it with criminal cruelty.

The newspaper went on: "The lack of unity that marked the Kenseikai so conspicuously when the bill in question was introduced in the diet for discussion gave silent, but nevertheless eloquent confession to the general incompetence of the Kenseikai as an opposition party. This deserves the regret of the people, since much depends upon the sound development of the opposition parties for the improvement of a constitutional government."

The Kokuminto opposition party introduced a suffrage bill and successfully secured primary consideration for it. It was defeated. When the Kenseikai measure which was couched in similar terms came up, Mr. Osaki and others declined to support it on the ground that its presentation was unconstitutional as the house of representatives had already disposed of a similar measure. For this Mr. Osaki and others were expelled from the party.

BLUE MAURITIUS STAMP MYSTERY STIRS AUSTRIANS

VIENNA, March.—A "Blue Mauritius" stamp mystery has been turned over to the police for solution. The story goes that a group of men were discussing stamp collections in a coffee house in the industrial suburb of Welner Neustadt when this dream of the philatelist was mentioned.

A car painter in the crowd asked why it was so valuable and when told replied: "Why I had an ancestor in Mauritius who wrote to the family regularly. We have bundles of his letters. He went to his home and when the envelopes were examined, one of the rare stamps was found."

The local philatelic society pronounced it genuine, whereupon the finder's new friends got a motor car and took him from place to place to sell it.

He admits he does not remember just what happened, but when he finally refused an offer of several hundred thousand crowns his stamp was given back. He took it to experts, who said it was a forgery. Stamp experts are assisting the police in uncovering the mystery.

The "Blue Mauritius" stamp is one of the world's philatelic prizes and commands a high price among stamp collectors throughout the world. One of the explanations of its rarity is to the effect that almost the entire issue of blue stamps sent from Great Britain to Mauritius was lost in a storm.

BRITISH WOMEN ENTER DIPLOMACY

LONDON.—British women are beginning to demand the appointment of members of their sex as diplomats in foreign services. They do not ask to be made ambassadors or ministers, but there is no knowing how soon they may. At present they seem to be contented with suggesting that women be appointed as counselors, one to each British embassy.

The idea has been put forward by Professor Winifred Cullis of Cambridge university, who stated in an address before the English Speaking union that women could aid the British ambassadors and ministers in interpreting the points of view of people of other nations, now that women have a voice in the government. She also proposed that women should be sent on special diplomatic missions.

Unfortunately, she added, many ambassadors are now strongly opposed to such ideas.
