uring a jury in the civil suit of F. C. Bramwell, state bank superintendent, against Chester C. Kubli, Applegate stockman, and member of a prominent pioneer Oregon family, for \$52,568.62, alleged to be due the defunct Bank of Jacksonville, Thursday afternoon.

In questioning jurors plaintiff's counsel stressed the query, "Will you accept the testimony of W. H. Johnson with the same degree of credence as any other witness?"

C. W. Palm, Medford capitalist, was excused after he admitted "prejudices against the books of the bank of Jacksonville" on motion of plaintiff, as was Frank Ray of this city. D. A. Applegate, of Ashland, was also "prejudiced against the bank books" and the court excused him "because you're an express agent."

Charges Against Kubli.

Three causes of action are embraced in the complaint against Kubli as follows:

For a promissory note for \$425, with interest at 19 per cent from January 22, 1918, and attorney fees of \$75.

For a promissory note of \$1200 at 8 per cent from January 29, 1920, and attorney's fees of \$150.

For overdrafts, checks and drafts cashed by the Bank of Jacksonville \$51,944.62.

A special venire of two jurors was called at 2:30 o'clock to fill the jury box, the regular panel being exhausted. Most of the talsmen claimed outdone and prejudiced. The venire consisted of F. J. Pipgras, Nick Kinne, and Ed White.

The jury as finally drawn, after 20 jurors had been examined, was: Fred Wagner, Justin Judy, C. L. aff W. H. Brown, J. M. Cronemiller, F. M. Corlies, E. C. Foss, J. H. Ralston, Carl Flechner, C. T. Hamilton, Frank Myers and Ed White.

The plaintiff admitted a double charge of \$8,840.90, reducing the amount alleged to be due to \$42,203.72.

Mother Distracted.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Mar. 25.—Mrs. Edgar E. Coney, mother of Lieutenant W. D. Coney, when informed at the home of relatives here that her son had probably been fatally injured in a fall at Monroe, La., rushed from the house declaring she would board the first train for Louisiana. She was found an hour afterwards on a street car by Lieutenant Coney's brother.

Mrs. Coney came here to see her son start his flight about 1:30 o'clock this morning.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Mar. 25.—Lieutenant W. D. Coney, 31st aero squadron, has been stationed at Sacramento, Calif., since February 1920. Only yesterday it was announced that he had just been promoted to a first lieutenantcy.

He was a member of the aerial forest patrol last summer and at one time was adjutant at Mather Field. Prior to coming to Mather Field, Lieutenant Coney was in the office of the chief of the air service at Washington, D. C., and previous to that time he was an instructor in aerobatics at a flying field in Florida. He is 27 years of age, according to Mather Field officers. His mother, Mrs. E. M. Coney, resides at 928 Ninth street, Brunswick, Ga.

Lieutenant Coney was stationed in Medford last year and has many friends in the city. On Labor day last September he provided the big thrill at the Barber field dedication by executing a hair raising parachute drop. He was a very likeable young man and was regarded as the most daring aviator on the coast.
