For the fourth consecutive month, the Rogue River cow-testing association won the February championship for both the highest average butterfat production and the largest number of honor cows that yield 40 or more pounds of fat per month. The average yield of fat for the 230 cows of the association was 26.34 pounds, and the number of cows passing the 40-pound mark was 25. The entire number of cows tested in February was 1502, and their average fat production was 22.80 pounds, reports E. B. Fitts, federal and agricultural college extension dairymen for Oregon. The average yield of milk of all association cows was 5.33—only 20 pounds less than the average milk yield of the Rogue River association, which produced more than twice the average fat yield. 7*
