

CONSIDER RECALL NON-PARTIZANS NORTH DAKOTA

DEVILS LAKE, N. D., Mar. 30.—Whether or not to hold a recall election against several state officials with Non-Partisan league endorsements, including Governor Lynn J. Frazier and whether to initiate a number of laws which would effect the state owned properties, will be decided by the convention of anti-non-partisans, which will open a two-day session here this afternoon. Sentiment among delegates arriving early seemed to be divided on the question of a recall in June or later in the year, probably early in the fall.

Realization during the last few weeks that North Dakota will be unable to finance the planting of a crop this spring because bankers of the twin cities and the east refuse to handle North Dakota paper under present conditions, is swinging sentiment in favor of a recall, according to E. L. Richter of the Independent Voters association, which is opposed to the Non-Partisan league.

One proposed constitutional amendment, Richter said, would make the bonds of the Bank of North Dakota the direct obligations of the state, rather than of the various individual state-owned industries as at present. Such a change, he added, probably would meet objections of bankers to bonds now being offered for sale.

WARSAW, Ind., Mar. 30.—Virgil Decker, his mother, Mrs. Lydia Decker, and two brothers, Fred and Cal Decker, were indicted by the Kosciusko county grand jury which completed its investigation yesterday into the death of Leroy Lovett. Virgil Decker has been held in jail here on a charge of murder. His relatives were arrested today and brought to the jail here.

Fred and Calvin Decker were arrested at Fred Decker's home near Wood, Ind., Mrs. Decker was arrested at Elkhart, Ind., last night. She will be brought here. The indictments carry two counts. One count charges that Lovett was murdered by an attack with a heavy iron bar while the second count charges that the murder was committed with a deadly weapon unknown to the grand jury.

VIVIANI FORCED TO AWAIT NEXT IN BARBER SHOP

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30.—Rene Viviani, former premier of France, who arrived here last night on an official visit of courtesy to President Harding, presented his credentials as envoy extraordinary to Secretary Hughes today at the state department. Accompanied by Ambassador Jusserand, the envoy spent more than an hour in conference with Mr. Hughes. While having the rank of special ambassador, M. Viviani is not visiting the United States as a guest of the nation as he was in 1917. This accounted, it was said, for the fact that no official notice was taken of his arrival last night.

The same striking difference between this and his war-time visit to Washington was noticeable when the envoy dropped into his hotel barber shop early in the day for a shave. He was alone and no one recognized him, so he waited his turn for a vacant chair, answering the call of "next!" promptly despite his unfamiliarity with the English language.

FRISCO SUICIDE IS IDENTIFIED

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 30.—Positive identification of the man who shot and killed himself in the executive office of the San Francisco Bulletin yesterday after an unavailing attempt to obtain \$5,000 as J. N. Murray, son of a Johnstown, Pa., hotel proprietor, was established here today.

Identification was made by a traveling companion of Murray's and by H. C. Tanner, clerk in a hotel where Murray lived after coming here from Seattle last January.

According to the coroner's office Murray's parents are Mr. and Mrs. William Murray of Johnstown, and his father operates the Fort Stanwick hotel there.

Government Aroused

VIENNA, Mar. 30.—(By Associated Press.) The Austrian government is taking every possible precaution to prevent former Emperor Charles from re-entering the country from Steina-manger, west Hungary, where he is reported to have taken refuge. It is rumored, however, that semi-official statements that Charles is at Steina-manger are intended as a cloak to cover the fact that he already is en route to Switzerland.

Armed guards from various organizations have been stationed along the frontier to intercept the former emperor should he attempt to recross into Austria. The armories of the association of former officers are under heavy guard to prevent the removal of arms and the homes of all generals in the old imperial army are under police surveillance.

It is reported a large number of officers of the old army are hurrying in groups to towns adjacent to Steina-manger.

Little Entente Ready

Meanwhile the "little entente," comprising Czechoslovakia, Jugo-Slavia and Rumania, has served notice on the Austrian government that troops will be marched into Austria at the slightest indication that former Emperor Charles is to be permitted to remain in the country.

Uneasiness and nervousness prevail among all classes in Vienna where it is generally recognized the situation is one of the utmost gravity.

The government announced today it would order an investigation into the manner in which Charles crossed Austria into Hungary. There appears to have been some confusion in the first dispatches as to the time of the ex-ruler's arrival in Austria and his subsequent movements. It now appears he crossed Austria Friday night and entered Hungary Saturday.

West Hungary is cut off from communication with Vienna and dispatches from Budapest give the only news of what is transpiring in Steina-manger. These state General Lehar, commanding at Steina-manger, and Baron Pronay, commander of a battalion of White Terrorists, are with Charles, together with other "aristocrats."

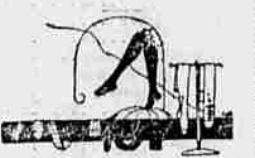
