Alleging negligence on the part of the California-Oregon Power company, the London & Scottish Insurance corporation has filed suit against the power company to collect \$98,085.72. This amount of insurance having been paid to the German company of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania said to be the owner of at least \$105,000 worth of lumber consumed by fire when the Kesteron mill at Worden, 20 miles south of Klamath Falls, burned on the 17th of last September.

The legal battle promises to be sensational, as the California-Oregon Power company is known to have been at work since the fire gathering evidence to defend the suit.—Klamath Falls Herald.
