STATE ENGINEER IS PLEASED WITH LOCAL IRRIGATION

The Medford irrigation district includes about 10,000 acres surrounding the city of Medford. The work is in progress on the distribution system on the west side. An effort is being made to secure a delivery through the waters of Bear creek in additional lands this season. The present Phoenix lateral serves about 1700 acres.

The Talent district is in a position to resume construction work on its project of \$500,000 upon the disposal of its bonds. The first unit of this project has been completed and work on the other units was suspended last year on account of the unfavorable construction and financial conditions. The Eagle Point district is engaged in completing its plans for the reclamation of about 6000 acres around Eagle Point. It is proposed to divert the waters of Big Butte creek for the irrigation of these lands, and upon the completion of the engineering plans the same will be submitted to the state engineer for approval.

All these projects lie in the Rogue River valley and their construction means much to the development of that section of the state.—State Engineer Copper in Salem Statesman.

COMEDIAN'S HEART BEATS IN 'THE KID'

"The Kid" is Charlie Chaplin's long awaited and eagerly anticipated first six-reel picture, which opens today at the Page theatre for a limited engagement of four days.

The heart of the greatest comedian that the world thus far has produced is in "The Kid." It is his finest gift of merriment to men and women; yes, and children, emphatically, children, too. The story shows Chaplin a conspirator against the peace of the police and master of a precocious youth whom he trains to be a pal. "One scene," says Harris, "that I shall never forget is that in which the kid goes and breaks the windows in advance and Charlie comes afterwards to make money by mending them. How the kid gets caught by policemen, how he gets away, and the various vicissitudes of the Street Odyssey comprise a pictured story that is simply enthralling."

And one of the most important of the numerous events of premiere consequence in connection with the offering of "The Kid" at the Page theater today is the arrival on the screen of little Jackie Coogan, Chaplin's co-star and richly endowed youth of tender years and precocious gifts, whom Chaplin discovered and recognized as a kindred spirit and a brother in genius.

CHICAGO, April 6.—With the Belgian team of DeGruyve and Reliens firmly entrenched in second place, the riders in the six day bicycle race had covered 945 miles, six laps, at 11 a. m. today, the sixtieth hour of the grind. Corry and McBeath, the Australian team, are leading with 27½ points.

WILL CARRY ON HOG TESTS IN JACKSON COUNTY

At the present time we are all interested in what it is actually costing to produce our products on the farm. This information is essential to well organized enterprises of the farm business. Through the office of the county agent of Jackson county and the county Farm Bureau, several hog feeding tests have been started in various sections of the county to ascertain the actual cost of producing pork under average farm conditions with the idea of gaining information that will be of help to all farmers who grow hogs, in knowing which practices prove most economical.

One of these tests will be carried on with J. E. Judy of Medford. In this test, eight pigs weighing 102 pounds have been placed on alfalfa pasture. They will be given ground barley in a self-feeder by the "help yourself" method. This lot will be weighed after thirty days feed and the cost of gains will be computed. Mr. Judy has another lot of pigs that will be placed on similar test as weavers about May 1. These, however, will not have access to the self-feeder but will be hand fed on a limited ration with alfalfa pasture. Another test was started on the farm of E. E. Dimick in the Evans Creek section. This lot weighs 127 pounds average. They will be fed "Hog Eats," a concentrate prepared by the Farm Bureau Exchange, for thirty days in a self-feeder and will be given access to alfalfa pasture.

Another lot of thirty-six hogs will be tested on the farm of F. L. Bonson. This lot will be fed ground wheat through self feeders. They are to be pen fed and will not have access to pasture, but a short time, when they will be pastured on eye.

It is the plan to weigh all these lots about May 1. The information gained will be of value to other hog growers in Jackson county. The results will be given publicity as the tests progress. Assistant County Agent Fred Holbaugh will keep watch of results. Other tests will be started as the season advances and other feeds are made available.

OWEN'S OVERDRAFT MAY REACH \$70,000

Investigations to date into the books of the defunct Bank of Jacksonville show that C. H. Owens, former Rogue River Valley orchardist, Nevada land agent, and more recently an oil promoter, arrested in Salt Lake City, overdrew his account in the bank in the neighborhood of \$40,000. Assistant Superintendent of Banks Kahler, in charge of the bank affairs, estimates that further survey of the books will show an indebtedness of between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

W. H. Johnson, ex-cashier of the institution will be taken to the bank today to arrange the accounts, and assist in ferreting out the maze of figures in Owen's account. Whatever additional is discovered in Owen's overdraft will be referred to the next session of the grand jury, or embodied in a supplemental indictment. Owen was originally charged with having an overdraft of \$21,000, and with "willfully aiding and abetting a bank cashier to defraud a bank."

PRIZE BULL CALF IN I. A. MERRIMAN'S HERD

I. A. Merriman recently purchased a fine Jersey bull calf from Mr. Williams of Gresham, Ore. This animal carries some of the best blood lines in the Jersey breed on the Pacific coast, being the direct descendant of four gold medal bulls, St. Mawes, Poppy's St. Mawes, Rosaries Olga Lad and Golden Glow's Chief. His dam produced 557 pounds of butterfat at a junior three years old while the grand-dam and great-grand-dam produced over 600 pounds of butterfat on test. The Rogue River valley is fast taking its place in the front ranks of production throughout the state, and Jersey cows are making some remarkable production records.
