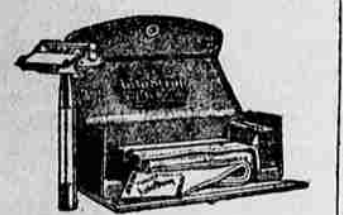

OLD AUTO CAMP GROUNDS TO STAND UNTIL NEXT YEAR

At last Medford is to have a city auto camp grounds with nice surroundings and comforts, which will prove inviting for tourists for the coming season, and next year will undoubtedly have new and commodious city auto camp grounds. This was decided at this week's meeting of the city council.

The matter was brought to a head by the determined attitude shown by Mayor Gates, who stated that something must be done at once to get ready as quick as possible to welcome the hosts of auto tourists that will pass through and stop in the city this summer and fall. The councilmen had been unable to agree on the question of purchasing new auto camp grounds, which subject has been under consideration for a year past.

Therefore it was agreed to continue the lease of the present grounds for this year, and Mayor Gates and City superintendent Chas. Davis were authorized to go ahead, have the present grounds cleaned up, graded and improved at whatever expense was justified in their judgment.

Work will begin within a day or two, when carpenters will commence the erection of a pergola 100 feet long, 12 feet high and with bungalow roof, and lattice work, to serve as a shelter, recreation and dining room quarters. Quick growing 30-day vines will be planted at once to cover this pergola.

Electric lights will be installed throughout the grounds, and a row of small furnaces to furnish warmth nights and mornings will be built, as will a septic tank and lavatories. Painted garbage and refuse cans will be scattered throughout the grounds, and if the auto camp is named "Keene Retreat" in honor of Councilman Keene as is contemplated, these cans will be artistically hand painted.

These are only a few of the many improvements contemplated.

C. OF COMMERCE ANNUAL MEETING ON APRIL 13TH

The new song book of the Medford Chamber of Commerce is to be furnished the students of the Medford public schools. This was decided upon by the board of directors of the Chamber last evening, after being recommended to them by the forum.

A supplementary membership campaign was decided upon for the next week of April 13-23. The annual meeting date was set for next Wednesday evening and it will be held at the public library. A pro-committee was ordered appointed.

A report of the activities of the Medford Chamber of Commerce during the past fiscal year was approved. This is in chart form and covers the work in detail, yet in very simple form. The financial report as presented was ordered audited and sent to the members.

B. W. Paul as chairman, C. A. Meeker and A. W. Hubbs were appointed as a committee to have charge of the Oregon Products Week of April 25-30. Several requests for funds in support of road associations were denied. The old board completed the work of the year and within a few days the newly elected members and the holdovers will elect the officers for the second fiscal year under the reorganized plan of operation.

USE FORCE IN COAL STRIKE

Unrest occurred in the town of Cowdenbeath, Scotland, last night. A shop window was broken and the contents of the place were carried away. The police dispersed the crowd with their clubs, according to a Central News dispatch.

Transport workers of the British fleet in the Fifth of Forth have been given sleeping berths on the battleships Crescent and Rosyth. Double guards have been placed on all caissons in the Forth area.

LONDON, April 7.—(By the Associated Press)—Leaders of the miners union, who conferred with Prime Minister Lloyd George this morning refused this morning to order pump men and engineers into mines affected by the coal strike to resume work, pending negotiations with the mine owners.

Leaders of the transport workers' federation which already has decided to support the miners, met this morning but adjourned until four o'clock this afternoon.

Miners Stand Firm. The National Union of Railwaymen also convened during the forenoon, but it remained in session to hear the result of the premier's conference.

The conference of the prime minister and the miners' leaders lasted upwards of two hours. Mr. Lloyd George, who was accompanied by Sir Robert Horne, chancellor of the exchequer, Thomas J. McNamara, minister of labor, and officials of the mines department, urged the miners to accede to the owners' condition that pumping be resumed, pending negotiations. The miners' representatives declared they were unable to assent to this and shortly after the adjournment of the conference, the board of trade issued an official statement saying:

"The negotiations have broken down."

Here's the way the Ashland Tidings of Wednesday sizes up the frost-frost situation of the week: "This morning was the third in succession for a white frost to fall in the Rogue River valley, just at the time to catch the fruit trees in full bloom. While it is too early to ascertain the exact amount of damage done to the fruit, fears are entertained in many sections that the fruit in the valley, especially the early peaches and cherries, are severely hurt, if not entirely so. In some parts of the valley, it is stated, the frost will not entirely kill the fruit, as the blossoms have been so thick on the trees that they form a protection to one another, thus saving several out of a cluster. Even if a large percentage of the blossoms are frozen, there may still be much fruit mature, as the blossom is particularly heavy this year."
