OREGON MOTOR A. PUTS OUT FINE NEW ROAD MAP

The Oregon State Motor association has issued a road map of the state in a campaign to make Oregon "the playground of the world." The map shows all roads, paved and gravelled, and describes southern Oregon counties with this inscription across the top: "It is well said that southern Oregon is the sportsman's paradise, and for the outdoor man the counties of Coos, Curry, Deane, Jackson, Klamath and Josephine, nature has been lavish." At the bottom is the advice: "Do not leave southern Oregon until you have fished Crater, Diamond, Klamath, and Odell lakes." The map also contains descriptions of Ashland, Medford, Grants Pass, Roseburg, Marshfield and Klamath Falls, with stress upon Crater Lake, the Josephine Caves, Ithia Springs, and the fishing and hunting possibilities. The map was printed with the "Courtesy" of the State Highway Commission, and will be a valuable adjunct to every autoist's trip.

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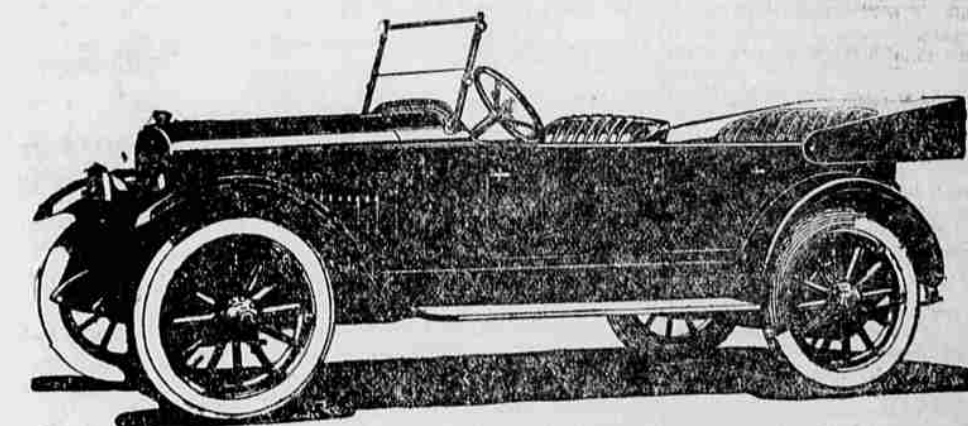
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
