17 GOVERNMENTS IN UKRAINE DIST. IN FOUR YEARS

PRAGUE.—Seventeen different governments have been upset and supplanted with entire changes of authority in the Ukraine since 1917, says the Volla Roasi, a Russian daily paper published here by social-revolutionists. The revolutions, it is said, have been due to the struggles of the peasantry against the successive rule of the Germans, the Cossack hetman, the land barons and, finally, the bolsheviks.

After telling about the revolts of the Little Russians against "authority imposed upon them without their consent," the article says:

"A radical change has occurred in the psychology of the peasant masses, a change which may be termed 'psychologic atavism.' It is as if the souls of the people were changed back to the times of the 19th and 17th centuries, the times of the Tartar invasions, the slave markets of Constantinople in the struggle for the right to live on the ground drenched with the blood of their forefathers.

"Starving north Russia has sent forth scores of thousands of soviet employes and bag speculators (persons dealing in foodstuffs carried in bags on their backs) to the fertile Ukraine provinces, in quest of food, while about 200,000 soviet troops are stationed in the cities, towns and hamlets of the Ukraine.

"Many families from north Russia are migrating to the south to escape death by starvation. At the same time the soviet authorities have taken steps to mobilize the male peasant population and send them away to the north and to the Ural, in an effort to combat the rebellion of the peasantry. The cruelties of the Austro-German period of occupation are as nothing compared with the horrors of the soviet activities in the Ukraine."

The earlier cruelties toward the peasant rebels, such as flogging, confiscation of farm implements and depletion of their resources, has been followed, the article says, "by punitive expeditions, wholesale executions, hangings and shootings."

IRISH WOMEN ARE SUSTAINING FORCE IN THE SINN FEIN

DUBLIN.—Women are the inspiration and the sustaining power of the Irish National movement.

This is well recognized throughout Ireland, even by British government officials whose task of subduing Sinn Fein militants and restoring peace has been made ten-fold difficult by reason of it. Wherever one goes in this country he hears extolled the "spirit of the women."

Women shelter, feed and bind up the wounds of the "flying columns" of the Irish republican army. They collect money for the Dal Fianna, they sew and nurse and do a hundred other things that fall to women in war time.

What some of them do outside woman's accustomed sphere of activities can only be conjectured. General Strickland, governor of the huge area now under martial law, told the correspondent that women carried concealed under their skirts and cloaks the rifles, bombs and revolvers which were used by the men responsible for a number of ambushes of crown forces in the Cork district.

Nothing in the last six months of guerrilla fighting has more intrigued the imagination of newspaper readers than the arrest of the 14-year old peasant girl of Cork county who, wearing steel armor around her body, was caught while snuffing across a field lugging a Lewis machine gun.

Women, according to report, accompanied various parties of the republican army who shot and killed the 14 British intelligence officers on Dublin's "Black Sunday" last November.

A proclamation recently spread broadcast through Ireland was headed "Stand Fast! Say the Women of Ireland." After lauding the republican army the proclamation continued: "We men and women of Ireland will stand by our army till the certain day of victory. We glory in their heroism under torture and in their deeds of valor in the field. We repudiate the calumny that our brave soldiers are a 'murder gang.' We must defy the enemy's insolent command to refuse food and shelter to our own countrymen. We scorn all proclamations that would make Irish men and women traitors to their country, and we will be as true to our soldiers as Nurse Cavell to England's."

Besides the Countess Markievicz there are a score or more of prominent Irish women serving prison terms or waiting trial for their zealous efforts to further the cause of Irish independence. They include doctors, teachers and several young women conspicuously identified with the Irish language revival.

Galleries Crowded

Senate galleries also were crowded, the overflow extending far outside of the doors. Two new senators, Peter Norbeck of South Dakota, and Hol O. Bursom of New Mexico were sworn in by Vice President Coolidge.

Senators Lodge of Massachusetts, the republican leader, and Hitchcock of Nebraska, the acting democratic leader, were named by the senate a committee to act with a similar committee from the house in notifying President Harding that congress was in session and ready to receive communications from him.

A conference of republican senators tomorrow was called by Senator Lodge to adopt the slate of committee assignments.

State Law Upheld

WASHINGTON, April 11.—State laws dealing with illegal traffic in drugs are enforceable even in conflict with the federal narcotic act, the supreme court decided today. Decisions of the supreme court of Minnesota relating to violations of the state statutes was affirmed.
