THYE TO WRESTLE HAND TO FINISH ON APRIL 26TH

Ted Thye, recognized as the middleweight wrestling champion of the world, has been matched for a return bout with Ralph Hand, the pride of Gold Hill, and adjacent territory, at Gold Hill, on Tuesday, April 26th. It will be a finish match, with \$1,500 guarantee for Thye, plus 75 per cent of the gate receipts if there are any in excess of that sum. A \$250 forfeit has been posted for the contenders to make ring-side weight at 165 pounds and the contest will be the best two out of three falls. Police Gazette rules will govern.

Thye and Hand recently clashed at Gold Hill in a handicap match, that Thye lost. This was no balm to the middleweight king, and he sought a return match, to settle the

question of supremacy. If Hand should win the match, he will hop right up into the topnotchers of the wrestling game. Thye meets Walter Miller on May 4th in Los Angeles, a wrestler who beat Joe Turner, but has been beaten twice by Thye. Thye is recognized as middleweight champion.

The April 26th engagement is the most attractive athletic event ever staged in southern Oregon, and will attract more than usual attention throughout the northwest, the problem being to supply seats for all those who will want to see the match, including many women.

'THE SWEETHEART SHOP' AT PAGE THEATRE TONIGHT

"I like to laugh myself, and I love to make others laugh. Born that way, I guess," says Esther Howard, the talented young comedienne of "The Sweetheart Shop," at the Page theatre tonight.

"I tried once to play an ingenue. I made a character study out of her and the character was an unexpected comedy hit. It's a curious thing, but it always the queer thing about people that I see first. Queer clothes, queer mannerisms. I've followed a woman for blocks on the street just to see some queer trick she had with her hands or the way she walked, or something about her dress that was out of the ordinary. For one thing it interests me, and for another, I wanted to make a mental note of it for future use. In my business you never can tell when something of that sort will come in handy.

"For instance the awkward use of my hands and arms in my first dance in 'The Sweetheart Shop.' When I was a little girl a young woman who lived next door to us always did that when she came to a dance, and many a boxing of the ear I've gotten from my mother for imitating her. My mother was afraid I'd offend her, but I guess my merriment was justified judging from the way the audience laughs at my imitation. I've got a lot of things like that stored away in my memory, and I'm always on the look-out for new ones. I never use the same mannerisms twice.

"The mistake, I think, that many character actresses make is allowing themselves to acquire mannerisms of their own. One actor or actress croaks, I a part and some peculiar grimace or wink or tone of voice, just suits that part, and makes a hit with the audience. Probably the next role is quite different, but he goes on with that same funny trick and repeats it until it finally becomes a part of one's self and it isn't at all funny to the audience any more. My idea is to use all the mannerisms you can, but other people's not your own."

BEN SHELDON IS NEW PRESIDENT C. OF COMMERCE

The officers elected to guide the activities of the Medford Chamber of Commerce for the next fiscal year are Ben C. Sheldon, president, H. L. Walther, vice-president and V. H. Vawter, treasurer. The selection of officers took place at a meeting of the board of directors at which they authorized the appointment of a committee on committees, a forum committee, a committee to submit a budget to guide expenditures, a committee to audit the monthly accounts and one to look after the requirements of office equipment and headquarters building.

Seven committees, which were appointed by the last administration, were ordered to be continued because of their work being incomplete. V. H. Vawter and George T. Collins were appointed a special committee to arrange for the meeting of the Portland delegation which will be in Medford on Thursday in the interest of improving Crater Lake accommodations. A delegation from Klamath Falls will attend this conference.

Membership in the association is not necessary for residents of the county to attend this dinner and meeting. An effort is being made to get a good attendance from Ashland, Medford and intermediate points as well as residents of Central Point and vicinity.

An interesting meeting has been planned in the interest of furthering greater activity in the preservation of the scenery of Jackson county. Benj. F. Lindsay of Medford is president of the association, Mrs. I. C. Williams of Talent, vice-president and J. W. Elden is the Central Point representative on the board of directors.

SHELDON SPEAKS AT THE ASHLAND FORUM

At the Ashland Chamber of Commerce's weekly forum, held this noon, Representative Ben C. Sheldon gave a talk on "Educational measures considered at the recent session of the legislature." Mr. Sheldon was chairman of the educational committee of the house. The speaker made special reference to the two sharp fights on school matters of the session; that over the free text book bill and that regarding the Portland teachers' tenure of office bill. The two most important bills passed, from the standpoint of the educational future of the state were, according to Mr. Sheldon, the county unit bill and the one designed to gradually require better and better preparation of teachers for the grade schools.
