BRITISH ADMIRAL HAS NO MORE USE FOR BATTLESHIPS

LONDON—Admiral Sir Percy Scott, commander of the aerial defense of London in the world war, has no use for battleships. He believes the British navy would be better off if it spent the 40,000,000 pounds intended for battleship construction in research and providing newer weapons of warfare.

"The late war," Sir Percy said, "showed that the only safe policy as regards battleships was to use them away as far as possible from the enemy. If we go to war now with France I do not think our battleships will be safe unless we construct a harbor to contain them in Iceland."

Speaking of the latest developments in death dealing instruments, Sir Percy explained the principles of the new Davis gun, which fires from both ends and with which he said all American airplanes were to be armed.

Speaking of the progress that had been made in planning aerial attacks on warships, Sir Percy Scott said, in an interview in the Evening Standard: "It is now known to every man in the service knows it—that had the war lasted another fortnight, we would probably, by means of an aerial attack, have sunk all the German ships in the Kiel Canal."

TRENTON, April — Interesting light has been thrown on the operation and speed of "Jersey justice" as a result of recent convictions for murder and other crimes. While misdemeanors and felons have increased in New Jersey, as elsewhere in the country in the past year or so, state records show that there have been few disagreements of juries and prison sentences have been extended to maximum limits in order to discourage violators of the law.

One feature of New Jersey law that few, if any, of the other states have, and which is said to have been a prime factor in giving the state its traditional reputation for lightning-like court procedure is a provision that a jury in a first degree murder trial may designate life imprisonment instead of the death penalty for the convicted person.
