### LEGION BOYS TO CAMP, YOSEMITE, WEEK AUGUST 22

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 2.—The annual encampment of the California Department of the American Legion and its Women's Auxiliary will be held in the Yosemite valley the week of August 22, according to an announcement by George J. Hatfield of the convention committee. Headquarters will be maintained in the government pavilion.

A pilgrimage to the Big Trees Aug. 27 and dedication of a giant sequoia to an "unknown hero," typifying the American soldier, will conclude the encampment.

An attendance of 5000 or more is expected by Mr. Hatfield, who urged that all persons expecting to attend make reservations at once with Walter H. Killam, of Merced, chairman of the encampment committee, which will assign the various reservations to Yosemite lodge, Camp Curry and other resorts. Arrangements were made with the resort managers last week to take care of all persons who made reservations for the encampment.

Organization and the appointment of committees will occupy the opening day of the encampment. While the committees are at work the following day, the great body of delegates will have an opportunity to make trips to Hetch-Hetchy and other interesting sections of the park. On the 24th, the committees will make their reports and the encampment will get on them. Election of officers will be held the 25th. The 26th will be devoted to the social side of the meeting, a big rodeo being held and a "grand potato polo" match with the Yosemite post—only national park post in the country—challenging all comers. At night there will be a big barbecue of steers donated by Merced county stock raisers. The solemn dedication of a Big Tree to an unknown hero will occupy the 27th.

### ALASKA IS LOSING HER TOTEM POLES, NATIVES ALARMED

KETCHIKAN, Alaska.—Alaska is losing her totem poles. Unless steps to preserve them are taken, summer tourists of the future will not be able to stand and wonder at these quaint monuments, rising skyward and telling of carved animal heads and inscriptions from forgotten Indian languages, folk lore stories of the old northland tribes.

On account of the gradual decline in observance of the old native customs totem poles are no longer erected and the elements are wearing down those left standing. Suggestions have been made that some organization direct the work of preserving the remaining poles for posterity.

Twenty-five miles from Ketchikan, in the abandoned Indian village of Old Kassan, about 150 totems are standing. This collection is said to be the largest in the north. The village was deserted several years ago when the native residents moved to New Kassan, following destruction of their old homes by fire.

Old Kassan's totems are of many sizes and descriptions. Some are of imposing proportions, with the four distinct emblems of the bear, the crow, the toad and the eagle represented. The poles are carved, from base to pinnacle, with gorgeous sign language. The totems are carved on cedar, which is slow in perishing.

In the graveyard of Old Kassan there is an old house, where, according to traditions, Chief Skowl, a storied ruler of the early tribes, held council and where after his death he lay in state for days.

At each corner of the chief's house is a large section of hollow tree supporting the roof. Strange hieroglyphics are carved on each slab and nearby is a huge reproduction of a whale carved from a tree.

### 1921 PROMISES TO BE RECORD YEAR FOR ROAD WORK

Five parallel trans-continental highways—duplicates of the Lincoln highway—would represent the highway construction completed in the various states during 1921.

Approximately 20,000 miles of new improved roads were finished according to reports sent in to the travel and transport bureau of the U. S. Goodrich Rubber company. Estimates from state highway engineers say that half again and possibly double this mileage will be completed during 1921.

Nebraska, Texas and Minnesota were among the leaders in total mileage of new construction. Nebraska built 1307.5 miles; Texas, 974.59; and Minnesota, 911.06; Oregon 459.10. Nearly every state reports mileage under construction almost equal to the total actually finished. Many of the states were unable to submit figures on highway construction.
