The letter states that the negroes of that vicinity had for some time been gambling in the woods, and he believes the murders were committed by the negroes themselves and the blame placed on Williams by a trumped-up confession of a negro farmhand, Clyde Manning. Carroll states that while both races are aghast at the murders, there is no evidence of ill-will between the two, despite an outbreak that was reported to have been scheduled for March 26.—Portland Journal.
