PASSPORT FRAUDS REGULAR TRADE IN THE BALKANS

CONSTANTINOPLE—Swindling of travelers in connection with passport visas has become one of the favorite means of livelihood of minor officials in the Orient and Balkan countries.

Mrs. J. H. K. Polly, wife of an American business man living in London, was recently a victim of this fraud while travelling on the Orient Express, running from here to Paris.

When the train was passing from Bulgaria into Serbia, at 2 o'clock in the morning, an official in uniform representing himself as a Serb inspector, demanded to see her passports, informed her that the visa obtained at the Serb Legation in Constantinople was invalid and ordered her to leave the train. After protestations, he consented to accept \$35 to let her continue her journey. She had already paid \$30 for visas of her passport.

Before leaving Constantinople many travelers are obliged to give large sums to get visas which later may be declared invalid in this manner.

NEWSPAPERS IN CONSTANTINOPLE IN 4 TONGUES

CONSTANTINOPLE—The task of editing a local newspaper here is exactly four times more difficult than in an American city for here there are Turkish, British, French and Italian censors.

A paper here after the censors have finished with it sometimes bears little resemblance to what the editor intended.

Here are gathered some 20 nationalities, and each requires an organ. The Greeks have seven newspapers in their own languages, and one printed in French; the Armenians have four in their own language and one in French; the Turks have nine dailies, in their own language. The Jews have one in French and two dailies in Spanish, the French have one in their language, the commonly spoken and written language of the Levant; and they also pay subsidies to several others. The British have one—the Orient News.

The Arabs have their organ. So do the Persians. Likewise the Russians, anti and pro Bolshevik. Strange peoples from other lands have their little sheets. The Americans print a magazine of business and a weekly, the Far Seas, printed by the United States navy. The Italians used to have their organ, and soon will have it again. The Greek Patriarch has his. There is also in French the weekly bulletin of the Vatican's Apostolic Vicar.

It is an easy matter to print a paper in English or French. However, consider that the Jewish paper is printed in Hebrew letters but in the Spanish language, also that the Turkish language requires four kinds of type and has 30 letters to its alphabet. The Arab language is a good deal like the Turkish, except that it is different in accent marks, and the same may be said of the Persian.

Now put four censors, each of a different political opinion, onto the job of eliminating the undesirable part of these newspapers, mix with three or four interpreters to each censor, so he will know what it is all about and the result is a distracted lot of editors who print the news when they may.

The editors claim they often are obliged to print their paper four times over before issuing it. As this country of sunshine and racial heat is also a land of exaggeration, they may not set up their papers so many times. But their printers' bills are heavy and, without racial pride to call forth supporting money, the papers would, many of them, cease to be published. Most of them do.

\$50,000 AWARDED FOR AFFECTIONS

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 14.—Fifty thousand dollars was the value a jury in the superior court placed on the affections of Mrs. Mary Hughes when it awarded a verdict of this amount to Philip Hughes against his brother, Patrick Hughes. Mrs. Hughes was recently granted a divorce from her husband. The parties are wealthy wheat ranchers, owning and leasing several thousand acres. The plaintiff asked \$200,000.

This is said to be the largest verdict ever given in the courts of this state in an alienation suit. The greatest amount ever sustained by the state supreme court is \$15,000. Attorneys for the defendant gave notice of appeal.

SPEAKER MINERS' CONVENTION HITS BLUE SKY LAW

PORTLAND, Ore.—No efforts have been made to protect small promoters, indispensable "side-partners" of the prospectors, during the era of paternalism which has swept the United States, Sidney Norman, editor of a Spokane, Wash. mining publication declared in a talk here recently at the Third International Mining congress.

Mr. Norman's subject was "Protection for the Promoter." He said "blue-sky" laws in thirty odd states of the union had so circumscribed legitimate efforts that the greater number of the "unconquerable optimists" who in past days brought the opportunities of the west to the public attention had given up the fight and migrated to other fields of effort. Mr. Norman said he thought this condition had done much to retard the prosperity of the west in a general way.

"It is inconceivable," he said, "that any western state anxious to develop its mineral resources should so circumscribe the efforts of honest men, in protection of fools who could not be protected outside the four walls of an insane asylum, as to make the business of promotion in a small way possible."

"The spirit of venture, which has built the west, must be preserved if we are to enjoy the prosperity of earlier days. Elimination of the hope of big reward, 'blue-sky', if you will, has limited the spirit that prompts the small investor to put his luck to the touch. Big corporations have never engaged in initial development work of prospects and probably never will. That must always be left to the contributions of the many, collected by the initiative, optimism and energy of the small promoter, spurred on by the hope of reward."

The speaker believed this to be one of the big questions confronting the mining industry and asked that deep consideration be given to formulation of some national plan by which the small promoter could be restored to former activity. He suggested that supervision of mining and oil corporations seeking capital by public sale of stock be placed in charge of the Bureau of Mines under some plan by which the promoter, after establishing his bona fides with the bureau, could automatically gain the right to seek capital in any state of the union.
