No estimate has been given out by the committee in charge of the supplementary membership campaign of the Medford Chamber of Commerce as to the number of new members they expect to secure, nor the amount of money that they will collect from the present membership in the "Pay As You Go" campaign.

There are approximately 240 prospects. This list was carefully prepared by a committee of citizens, taking into consideration their financial investments in the community and their ability to pay an annual membership fee of \$25.00, without the same being a hardship upon themselves or their families.

A year ago, a number of well-meaning citizens subscribed for memberships. They soon realized that they had assumed a responsibility which would be most difficult for them to carry out. The board of directors took the view that the Chamber of Commerce should not be an institution that should be a hardship for any of its citizens to support. They were of the opinion that many citizens, financially able, did not belong to the chamber and that efforts be made to get them to invest in a membership and the responsibility, which the willing ones, who were financially unable, had agreed to carry.

Every prospect has been notified through the mail that his membership is desired. Sales arguments have been presented to them and several of them have come to the headquarters and have purchased three year memberships.

LOCATION AND AMOUNT—All the merchantable dead timber standing or down and all the live timber marked or designated for cutting on an area embracing about 6,280 acres in Twp. 35 S., R. 4 E., surveyed, and Twp. 36 S., R. 4 E., W. M., unsurveyed, Four Bit Creek watershed, Crater National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 87,500,000 feet B. M., more or less, of western yellow pine, Douglas fir, white fir, sugar pine and incense cedar timber, approximately 81 per cent western yellow pine.

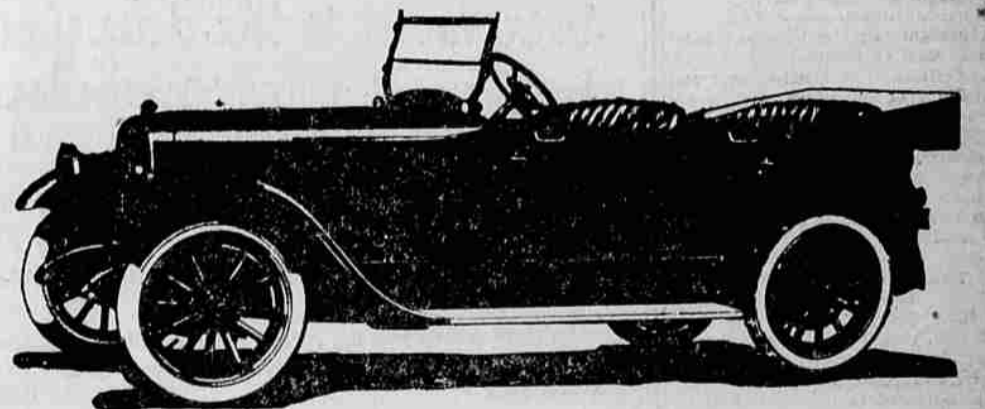
