Telegraphic information from Salem is to the effect that the irrigation and drainage commission has delayed certification of bonds of the Talent and Squaw creek district, each in the amount of \$25,000. The Talent bonds are required in connection with an agreement with the Jackson county court, whereby the road is to be changed so as to go around the Emigrant creek reservoir, for the purchase of additional rights of wa in the reservoir and for other purposes. The proceeds from \$15,000 Squaw creek bonds are required to meet outstanding indebtedness and the remaining \$10,000 is to be held future permanent improvements.
