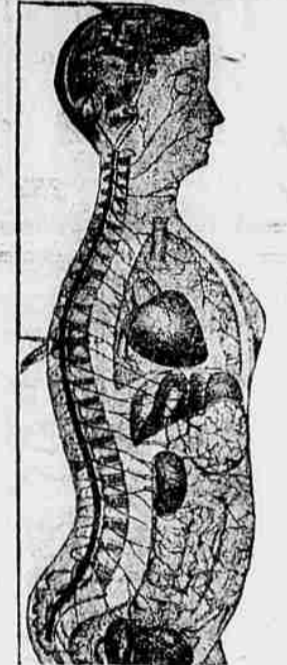

U. S. REFUSES TO MEDIATE (Continued from Page One) was displaying an active interest in the reparations question. The American answer is interpreted here as an invitation to Germany to resume negotiations with the allies. It is thought the United States will not continue the conversation with Germany except in accord with the allies. Secretary of State Hughes is understood in authoritative quarters here to have assured Ambassador Jusserand to this effect.

Vienna Hears New One VIENNA, April 22.—Announcements that the United States has accepted in principle Germany's proposal that Germany assume part of the allied debt to America have been received and there have been expressions of satisfaction from newspapers.

In its exchanges with the German government the United States has not accepted in any way the German proposal that Germany should assume any part of the allied debt to America. The foregoing Vienna dispatch would appear to indicate, however that a dispatch to the effect that the United States has accepted in principle Germany's proposal had been received at the Austrian capital from Berlin sources.

Germany Skeptical BERLIN, April 22.—(By Associated Press.) The trend of the comment in this morning's Berlin newspapers on Germany's appeal to President Harding for mediation in the reparations question, written in the absence of knowledge of what the American reply would be was skeptical of any good coming from the German move.

The nationalist press recalls the appeal made by Germany to President Wilson in 1918, just before the close of war, and asks why Germany is placing herself helpless in the hands of an ally of her enemies.
