

25 ADDITIONAL INDICTMENTS IN J'VILLE BANK CASE

In the neighborhood of 25 additional indictments and civil suits arising out of the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville, will be returned by the May term of the grand jury, convening May 16, according to Assistant Superintendent of Banks E. D. Kahler, in charge of the affairs of the defunct institution. The original indictments will be wholly upon recommendation of true bills already returned, asked and granted at the last term of court.

The May term of court will convene for the petit jury May 23, and a large docket is pending. Among the cases to be tried are those of Mrs. Myrtle Blakeley, former county treasurer, whose trial at the last term of court resulted in a hung jury. The charge is malfeasance in office, arising out of the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville, and one of the witnesses to be called by the defense will be Will H. Bennett, former state superintendent of banks, now living at Pendleton, Oregon.

Another case to be tried, postponed from the last term of court is that of W. P. DeWitt, an Ashland jitney driver, indicted for manslaughter as the result of the death of Mrs. Nona Jennings of this city in an auto accident on the Pacific Highway near Talent last Christmas Eve. The trial of C. H. Owens, former orchardist, now interested in Utah and Wyoming oil projects, indicted in connection with the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville, is also likely to be called at the next term of court. It is also expected that "Dutch Pete" Stauff and Frank Kodat, charged with an attempted robbery of the Gold Hill bank last week, will face a jury at the May term of court.

PARIS—Premier Briand announced it was his earnest desire that Paris obtain the Olympic games in 1924 and promised the moral and financial support of the government to that end.

BOSTON—The three-masted steel auxiliary schooner Guinivere, the largest sailing boat added to the American yachting fleet in more than a decade was launched yesterday. She was constructed for Edgar Palmer, donor of the Palmer memorial stadium at Princeton university, who will have as figurehead for his craft the image of the Princeton tiger.

CHICAGO—Home Run Baker was reinstated in organized baseball by Judge Landis and is expected to join the New York Yankees soon.

COLUMBUS—George Kotsaros, Columbus, threw John Freiberg, Chicago, in 46 minutes with a flying mare in a heavyweight wrestling bout last night.

DULUTH—The northern regatta will be held here July 22 and 23.

\$50 IN PRIZES FOR BEST WINDOWS IN H. PRODUCTS WEEK

Medford merchants are being offered cash prizes by the Associated Industries association of Oregon for the best decorated windows of Oregon made products.

There will be prizes for the three best windows—1st, \$25; 2nd, \$15, and 3rd, \$10. The windows are to be judged from their educational value, artistic arrangements and advertising value. The educational value can be best illustrated by saying: If there is a display of woolen products, the arrangement could show a fleece of wool in grease, a fleece of wool scoured, knitting yarn from which the fabric is made and so on up to the finished product. The window trimmer would, of course, have cards which would describe and make plain the various steps.

This offer should be an inducement for the Medford merchants to put an extra effort on a display of Oregon products. Merchants display and advertise goods made all over the country for 51 weeks in the year and it is only a very modest request that Oregon be given prominence during one of the 52.

If possible exhibits should be in place so that the general public could inspect them next Sunday, however, exhibits should be in place by Monday, April 25th and remain in the windows for a week.

PERSONALITY IS GREAT ASSET OF MARJORIE RAMBEAU

And that is the one medium that is not plastic and he cannot mould to his use or his purpose. He must use it as it is. "Therefore, in acting it may be said that the medium becomes in itself more important and effective than the work brought in it. In other words, all the skill of the actor, all his experience, all his conception, all his feeling, is of no avail if the public does not respond to him or her personally as a man or a woman.

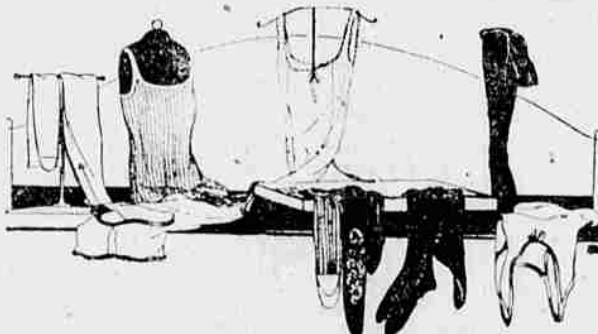
