DIGGER SQUIRREL**

Farmers generally are showing splendid cooperation in the squirrel poisoning work. The biological survey will put a crew to work in a few days cleaning up on government land in the county. Occasionally there are farmers who are not making any attempt to clean up the infested parts of their land and in these cases a forced clean-up will be made under the provisions of law. It has been necessary to do this on four different tracts of land in the Griffin creek district and forced clean-ups will be made in other districts where the farmers demand it and where they are doing all possible to clean up their own holdings. The results of this year's work will be very far reaching and where it is kept up over a period of a few years we will be almost free from this ravaging pest.

**MME. ROTHWELL
IS SOLOIST WITH
PHILHARMONIC**

Madame Elizabeth Rothwell, internationally known dramatic soprano, is the soloist with the Philharmonic orchestra of Los Angeles, now on its annual spring tour of five weeks. Owing to the heavy bookings of this famous organization only thirty-five of the larger western cities can be visited this year. The local concert will be given Friday night, April 29th, at the Page theatre.

This is Madame Rothwell's first appearance here. The compelling power of this great artist has won her unqualified recognition in Europe and America. The operatic annals of European music centers mention her name prominently as an artist who combines rare beauty of voice with eloquent interpretative talents. Thanks to her operatic experience Mme. Rothwell inspires her concert appearance with a dramatic element seldom found in the concert hall. Used to cope with the great climaxes of large orchestras, her voice has attained a range and a volume which rises easily above the total wealth produced by the seventy-five artist players of this remarkable organization. Incidentally, Conductor Rothwell, the husband of the soloist, is noted for the excellency of his accompaniments which serve as a well attuned harmonious background of the solo. Rudolf Ganz, the famous pianist, when playing with the orchestra, exclaimed that he had never found better support either by a conductor or orchestra.

**MALAY MISSIONARY
WALKING AROUND THE
WORLD, VISITS CITY**

A man of unique and interesting personality, who has often been referred to as the "World's Native," by name, Rev. Harrabelle A. Marangopa, by nativity a Malay and by occupation a missionary, spoke to a crowd at the corner of Front and Main streets last night, and will speak at the same location at 8 p. m. and 7 p. m. today, and in the Methodist church at Talent on Sunday night. He is walking around the world, gaining converts to the Christian religion with his wife as companion, although she travels by train between the last point visited to the next place they visit with their baggage.

The story of the perils, persecutions and sufferings he has endured in various countries since his babyhood is a thrilling one.

Born a savage, he was found by a British nobleman in a hut on the east coast of Africa, the sole survivor of a murdered family. He was taken to England as a curiosity, educated, converted and consecrated to the life of an itinerant evangelist. A man of quick, keen intellect, he has in his travels about the globe acquired no less than 29 different languages and dialects, being able to preach the gospel in 15 of them.

Tears ago he was commissioned by the Union Missionary Society of London to carry an evangelistic message around the world. He started on his world tour in 1897, and in the intervening years has traveled entirely on foot a distance of 118,125 miles, preaching in Africa, China, Japan, India, Europe, Great Britain, the United States and Canada. Since his arrival in America he has walked, up to this date 21,125 miles and preached in 42 cities and 42 states.

He carries in his possession 25,000 newspaper clippings and 1500 letters of recommendation from the royalty of Europe and officials of cities and ministers of the gospel received through his travels.

**100 TREATIES
PRESENTED TO
LEAGUE NATIONS**

GENEVA, April 22.—Great Britain has forwarded to Sir Eric Drummond secretary general of the League of Nations four additional treaties for registration with the secretariat of

the league, including the commercial convention concluded with the Russian soviet government. These bring the number of treaties registered to date to more than 100.

Twenty-two of the treaties are from Great Britain, thirteen from the ambassadors council, acting in the name of the principal allied powers; twelve from France and twelve from Germany. Among the documents are the notes relative to the Anglo-Japanese alliance, the note concerning the Franco-Belgian military alliance, the San Remo convention and six treaties concluded by the different powers with the soviet government.
