Nine hundred and sixty-two ounces of gold bullion, the result of a nine-day clean-up at the Boswell mine on Sucker creek, was brought to the city under armed guard last night by M. Norden, superintendent of the mine. The gold is worth \$17,565 at the San Francisco mint, where it will be shipped in a few days. Lately three shipments of gold to Grants Pass have been made, the bullion having been taken out in 24 days running, the bars being valued at \$24,000. The Boswell mine was always a heavy producer, rich values having been in sight for about six years, and \$46,000 in gold was taken out by the former owners before the present Boswell Mining company purchased the property.—Grants Pass Courier.
