LEAVE THE FINAL PLANS OF FAIR TO FARM BUREAU

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Jackson County Fair association held last evening at the city hall, the sale of the 45.3 acres of land to the east of the fair grounds was authorized at a minimum price of \$100 per acre.

A report of the building committee as well as a report of the finance committee were received but neither of them were accepted, other than to have them referred to the Farm Bureau. In the opinion of the directors the members of the Farm Bureau are the ones most vitally interested in having modern facilities for the successful conduct of an annual fair, and therefore no action should be taken by the fair association until any proposed plan has the endorsement of the Farm Bureau which is the only organization in the county truly representative of the farming population.

The directors of the fair association are of an open mind. They have refused to take the stand that this or that should be done to build up a successful fair. They are unanimous in their opinion that the fair is of greatest benefit to the farmer and that his desires and wishes must be respected as to what he wants done.
