RAILROADS VERSUS THE GAS ENGINE.

IN ANSWER to what is the matter with the railroads, experts seem to overlook the motor car and motor truck. THE IMMIGRANT BILL.

THERE are in the United States at present 10,000,000 unnaturalized aliens. From present indications, the total amount of immigration for the year ending next June 30, will be over 800,000. Millions more are eager to come. Less than three per cent of the immigrants that have been coming since the war are farmers.

In these circumstances it is easy to understand the insistent demands for haste in tightening the immigration laws, and the general approval given by native Americans to the pending restriction bill. That bill would hold European immigration from May 10 of this year to June 30, 1922, down to three per cent of the number from any particular country who were already here in 1910.

If government ever succeeds in operating on a scientific basis, we may attain to an immigration system whereby all our adopted citizens will be hand-picked by American representatives in their native land, and allowed to come to America only at such times and in such quantities as they are wanted, and will be assigned and distributed, on their arrival, to the particular sections and industries that can use them.
