

ASK IMMEDIATE HEARING ON BUTTE FALLS RAILROAD

The citizens of Butte Falls have petitioned the public service commission of Oregon to declare the railroad recently purchased by M. D. Olds as a public carrier. The owner objects to such action by the commission on account of the hazardous risk of carrying passengers and because of the expense of maintaining regular train service; however, he is willing to have the road declared as a carrier of forest products and is willing to deliver freight to Butte Falls about twice a week, free of any transportation charges. Mr. Olds is very anxious that the commission arrive at a decision by May 10th in order that he may perfect plans which he now has under consideration; therefore, the directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce have authorized a telegraphic request to the public service commission for an immediate hearing on the Butte Falls petition.

FIFTY MEDFORD CITIZENS WORK ON TABERNACLE

The big Bulgin-Lewis tabernacle began in the early part of the day to assume proportions. Some fifty men were on the job; each man doing his bit in making a go of erecting the building, which will be a busy place all during the month of May. The tabernacle will seat 2500 people. Mr. Lewis, the advance man, is directing the workers, and Shorty Garrett, as local chairman, is busy on the job all the time. A splendid spirit of co-operation is being shown, which augurs well for the coming revival meetings. Additional men will be needed for Thursday, when it is expected to complete the work. Noon was taken at noon, when the men adjourned to the basement of the Christian church, where they showed their appreciation of the splendid chicken dinner prepared by the ladies of the various churches. Friday at 7:30 p. m. all who will enter the big chorus choir are asked to be at the tabernacle for the first rehearsal. Sunday evening Dr. Bulgin will preach his first sermon, and it is expected that the big tabernacle will be full at the initial service. WOLGAMOTT CASE IS CONTINUED ON MOTION OF STATE

Motion for the continuance of the trial of Ernest "Dad" Wolgamott, charged with being drunk and disorderly, until Monday, May 2, was granted by Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor. The motion was filed by the district attorney's office, and was upon the grounds of "official business," the plea setting forth that Assistant District Attorney George A. Coddling, who was conversant with the facts in the case had been called out of town. Attorney George M. Roberts, representing Wolgamott, contested the granting of the continuance upon the grounds that the defense had retained witnesses from California, and the country districts, at considerable expense, and that an immediate trial should be granted. Attorney Roberts ridiculed the claim that "the district attorney's office had official business out of town." The court then granted the motion, and objections were filed by the defense. The case created considerable local interest, arising out of the arrest at Orth Hall in Jacksonville last Friday night of Wolgamott, who was charged with being drunk and disorderly, and has many angles. Attorney George Roberts was much incensed over the postponement of the case and issued the following statement this noon: "I have never believed in making any statement to a newspaper prior to the trial of any case, believing that the case should be tried upon the evidence submitted during the trial and that no attempt of any kind should be made to prejudice prospective jurors by statements made by either principals or attorneys prior to trial. However, having noticed some alleged quotations of Deputy Sheriff McMahon relative to the facts underlying the Wolgamott case, I will say that this case was set for trial at 10 o'clock Wednesday by order of the court, based on agreement of counsel, and that defendant was present with more than nine witnesses, all of whom were ready and would have refuted these alleged statements of McMahon in every detail and while Mr. Moore, district attorney, was in his office, and over the telephone asked for a continuance on the ground that the deputy district attorney had official business in Ashland, and he, Moore knew nothing about the case, they were unable to go to trial, to which we strenuously objected as we wanted this matter determined by a jury at once in order to save time and expense for all parties concerned, yet this continuance was granted."
