### DEMAND RELEASE YANKEES HELD BY SOVIET FORCES

**RIGA, April 30.**—The United States government has demanded the release of Americans held prisoner in soviet Russia, says a dispatch from Moscow today.

**WASHINGTON, April 30.**—Denial was made at the state department today that any new demand had been sent to the Russian soviet authorities, directly or indirectly for release of the Americans held prisoner in soviet Russia. The department has insisted that it was doing all in its power to procure release of the prisoners but it has refused to deal directly with the soviet authorities.

**CONSTANTINOPLE, April 28.**—An American engineer named Kelly, according to a Moscow wireless dispatch received here, has been sentenced by the bolsheviks to two years' imprisonment for circulating false reports tending to discredit soviet Russia.

Royal C. Kelly, an American engineer, was arrested in Moscow last spring. The charge against him was declared to be "economic espionage."

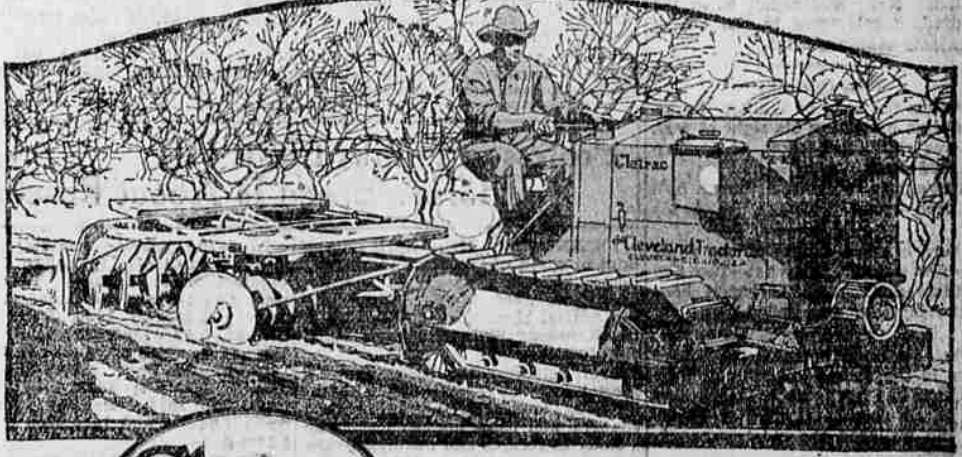
