

SEELEY HALL TO BE IN CHARGE OF LAKE TRAFFIC

According to announcement just made by Vernon Vawter and Geo. T. Collins, who are Medford members of the new Crater Lake company which has taken over the hotel, transportation and other concessions of the Crater National park from Alfred L. Parkhurst, the hotel capacity will be doubled at Crater Lake this summer by the addition of 75 commodious furnished tents with wooden floors, wooden walls eight feet high, doors, and glass windows with screens. These tents have already been purchased and will be placed in use when the season opens July 1st, being erected on the grounds adjacent to the hotel. The hotel and tents will accommodate about 350 guests.

Messrs. Collins and Vawter also announce that Seeley Hall has been chosen to have charge of the transportation between Medford and Crater Lake, and will give all his time to this important duty during the season. It had been announced that an experienced national park man was to have charge of this concession, but the new company wanted a man in charge whom they personally knew was capable and reliable, hence the selection of Mr. Hall. Medford people know that no better selection could have been made.

DISORDER REIGNS DUBLIN, NO SHOTS

DUBLIN, April 30.—Disorder reigned in this city for several hours last night, following the firing of a shot at police auxiliaries near the offices of the Freeman's Journal. Auxiliaries later raided the newspaper's plant, alleging that the shot had been fired from an upper story of the building but today's issue of the journal stated no arrests were made and that no evidence was obtained to support the charge.

At about the same hour a shooting affair occurred on Great Brunswick street.

It is reported that the raiders in their excitement, fired on the central police station when a policeman looked out of a window and refused to withdraw when ordered to do so by one of the auxiliaries.

MOONEY CALLED AS WITNESS IN FREEDOM FIGHT

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—An order directing the sheriff to bring Thomas Mooney, convicted of a bomb murder, to San Francisco from San Quentin prison Monday to testify in a proceeding designed to release him, was obtained today by Mooney's counsel. The proceedings will seek to show that Mooney was convicted through fraud. He is serving a life sentence.

The attorney was granted a writ of habeas corpus yesterday directing the warden of the penitentiary to produce Mooney in court. Today's proceeding is supplementary to the habeas corpus action and is designed to assist the warden in attending to the details of Mooney's removal outside of the penitentiary.

FRUIT MEETING AT PORTLAND MAY 2

Salem, Ore., April 29, 1921.

To Fruit Growers and Shippers: A preliminary conference of shippers and growers of the northwest, and particularly of Oregon, has been called to assemble at the offices of the Public Service Commission, 252 Court House, Portland, at 1:30 p. m. on Monday afternoon, May 2, to discuss and determine the manner of presentation of the transportation questions affecting this vast industry.

The growers, shippers and dealers in fruit, fruit products and vegetables in the northwest are facing a crisis by reason of the large amount of both green and manufactured fruit products now held in storage. It appears that there are thousands of car loads of fruit and similar products in warehouses, prevented by prohibitive carrier charges from reaching markets, and this too with a new crop coming in. If a financial loss is to be averted, it is imperative that some remedy of relief be promptly applied.

Therefore, it is hoped that all interested in the fruit industry in the northwest will be present at this conference to lend support toward placing forcefully before the Interstate Commerce Commission the actual conditions obtaining in the northwest affecting the fruit and fruit product markets.

ESPEE NOTIFIES EMPLOYEES OF A CUT IN WAGES

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—The Southern Pacific Railroad company today notified ten classes of its subordinate officials and employees of its desire to negotiate a revision of wages.

Approximately 20,000 workers are affected by the order, which will be operative thirty days from date. The order will have the effect of suspending the decision of the United States railroad labor board of July 20, 1920, which fixed the present rates of pay. A basic minimum reduction of 20 per cent is proposed in the order, the exact figure to be left to conferences between the company and each group of workers.

WOMAN KILLED FOR SCREAM IN HOLDUP

SOUTH ORANGE, N. J., April 30.—Four masked bandits today held up an automobile in which Mrs. Celeste Cassez of Orange was returning from a visit to a sick friend. When she screamed, one of the men leaped into the tonneau and choked her to death, while the others covered her chauffeur with revolvers.

BLIZZARD PREDICTED FOR EAST OREGON

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—A warning to provide against cold weather with high Northwesterly winds and snow flurries tonight and tomorrow was sent by the United States weather bureau today to stockmen in eastern Washington and Oregon, Idaho and Nevada. A heavy storm, which appeared off the Washington coast last night was moving over the plateau regions with but little lessening of intensity, the bureau said.

AMERICAN HELD BY REDS CALLS HUNGER STRIKE

RIGA, April 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—William Flick, American moving picture operator held captive in Russia, has declared a hunger strike in the prison in Moscow, where he is confined, according to information telegraphed here today by Captain Marion C. Cooper, the

American airman who recently escaped from a soviet Russian prison. Flick has declared in a written statement to the soviet government that he was an American, guilty of no crime and held in prison many months without trial. Hence his decision to secure either freedom or death.

Captain Cooper on his way to Warsaw, met a Polish diplomatic official who had just been released from the prison in which Flick is incarcerated. The official said Flick on April 1 had been nine days without food. He was then unable to move from his bed but was steadfast in his determination to starve to death unless he was freed, according to his recent companion in prison.
