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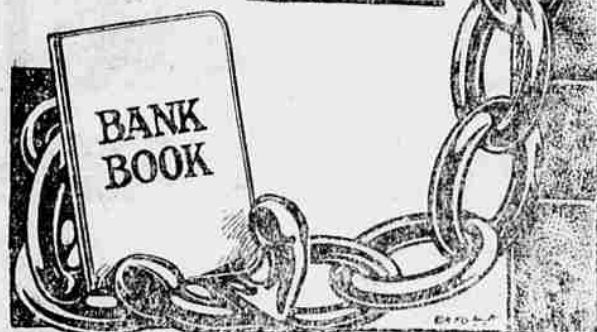

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URGES CREDIT AND TARIFF TO BRING BACK NORMALCY

CLEVELAND, May 4.—The eighth annual convention of the Foreign Trade Council opened here today with approximately 2000 delegates, representing every important industry in the country present.

James A. Farrell, chairman of the council and president of the United States Steel corporation, delivered the opening address. He emphasized the problems of long time credits for foreign trade and the matter of the American merchant marine.

The four main points of Mr. Farrell's address were:

The necessity for an extension of foreign credits to enable nations paralyzed by the war to buy in American markets; revision of the tariff on a flexible basis; plan to permit of the imposition of penalties for discrimination against American products or to give concessions for their favorable treatment; abolition of double taxation in order that American investments abroad may be exempt from domestic income tax and to place American exporters on an equality basis with British, French, German and Japanese competitors in foreign fields; development of the American merchant marine.

Fred L. Kent of the Bankers Trust company, New York, followed Mr. Farrell, his subject being "financing foreign trade." He recommended long time credits.

Very much the same point of view was expressed in the address of the next speaker, Governor W. P. G. Harding of the federal reserve board, Washington, D. C., who talked on "frozen credits—what they are and how to thaw them."

JAPAN TO HOLD SAGHALIEN TILL RUSSIANS REMIT

TOKIO, April 1.—(Delayed)—About eighteen million yen, or \$3,600,000, has been set aside for the maintenance of the army sent to Saghalien province, Siberia, and the new works to be started there for military purposes.

A regiment of infantry under command of a brigadier general is to be stationed at Nikolaievsk with a special detachment consisting of cavalry, artillery and engineers. Another detachment of infantry will be stationed at Mago and a battalion of infantry in the neighborhood of Dekastri and a small detachment at Sofisk or Malinsk.

A submarine cable will be laid between Nikolaievsk and Alexandrovsk. The re-occupation of the mainland part of Saghalien province was carried out by the Japanese army, announced in accord with the original project to hold Russian territory until suitable reparation is arranged by Russia for the Nikolaievsk massacre.

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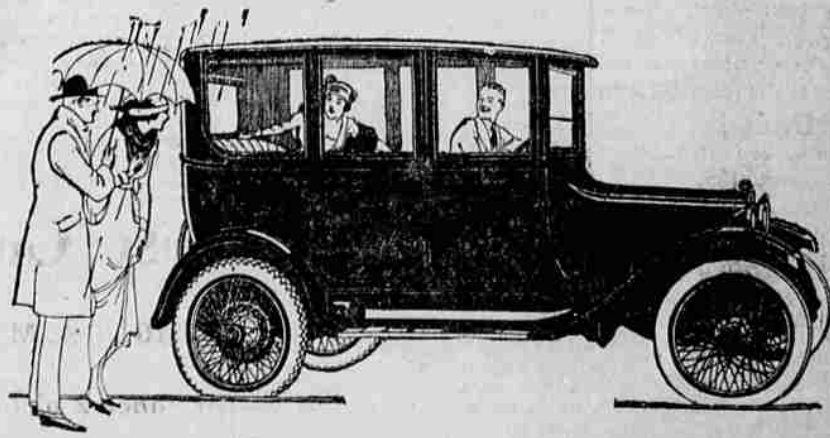
